

Gunman Wounds Grad Student

A University graduate student was shot by a fugitive gunman as he stood on a Eugene street corner March 18.

Milton Seligman, 29, a graduate in psychology from Anaheim, California, told the Emerald Monday he was recovering satisfactorily from the neck wound he received.

The gunman, Harvey Lee Baker, 33, of Salem, was fleeing police after an attempted holdup and a kidnapping which involved holding a Eugene family hostage for nearly four hours.

Baker was killed by police after his getaway car was stopped near 8th Ave. and Olive St. in downtown Eugene.

Seligman was standing at the corner of Broadway and Olive at about 7:30 p.m. as Baker's car pulled up nearby. The gunman fired a shot and Seligman slumped to the pavement.

He was taken to Sacred Heart Hospital and treated for the wound just above his collarbone.

Seligman was with his fiancée, Patricia Douglas, 28, a social worker for the Lane County Welfare Department. The couple was shopping for wedding clothes.

Baker had attempted to hold up the One O'Clock Market on W. 6th Ave. about 3:45 that afternoon. After being chased by police, he entered the home of Marvin Keeler, 358 W. 7th, and held the four in the family at gunpoint.

Baker had a long criminal record, including several prison terms served.

Seligman said Monday that he planned to register for classes as usual, and that he was "up and around" all right.

Former ASUO Prexy Heads Viet Nam Tour

Former ASUO President Phil Sherburne, now president of the National Student Association, is heading a two week tour of Viet Nam by NSA leaders.

The three men will visit several villages to observe social and economic projects recently started by the government of South Viet Nam and the U.S.

At its Congress last summer NSA passed a resolution that endorsed U.S. presence in Viet Nam but also called for a cease-fire and negotiations to end the war. Among those recommendations are negotiations with the Viet Cong, a pause in the bombing of North Viet Nam, and the continuation of the pause to be conditional on a response from North Viet Nam and the Viet Cong.

Before he left, Sherburne said, "We hope that whatever we can learn during our stay will serve to make the debate on American campuses even better informed than it is."

Sherburne said his group plans to spend much of their time talking with students. "We know very little of the views of South Vietnamese students on the present government there, on the American role, and on the great issues of the war itself. We plan to find out what those views are and we plan to communicate them to American students when we return."

Sherburne says NSA hopes to bring a delegation of Vietnamese students to the U.S. later this year to make a tour of college campuses.

He told reporters in Saigon that he felt the majority of American students support United States efforts in the war, although many differ about the aspects of the struggle.

Community Service and Public Affairs

New Professional School Wins Committee Approval

PORTLAND—The University's proposed School of Community Services and Public Affairs won approval "in principle" from the academic affairs committee of the State Board of Higher Education last week.

The University faculty earlier approved the new school, which is designed to provide training in public administration and social services. It will not involve the addition of many new courses.

According to a story in the Portland Oregonian, Charles Duncan, associate dean of faculties at the University, said that 90 per cent of the courses are already offered at the University. The new school will involve cor-

relating them into a unified program. Eventually some of these courses, now under other departments, may be transferred to the new school.

Among the jobs the school will prepare students for are city managers, administrators for city,

county, and state planning offices, civil service jobs, recreation directors, student and family counselors, youth workers, juvenile court workers, etc.

The program will also involve on-the-job training.

Roy Lieualten, chancellor of State System of Higher Education, said the University will be able to handle costs of setting up the school out of its own budget.

Miles Romney, vice-chancellor for academic affairs, said the new school is expected to attract a great deal of federal money.

The new school will eventually have its own building or complex of buildings.

Emerald Staffer Receives Award

Phil Semas, associate editor of the Emerald, has won a \$300 national award from the William Randolph Hearst Foundation.

Semas placed second nationally among student journalists with a four-part series on the University's Job Corps Center at Tongue Point. The series was entered in the February competition for investigative and interpretive writing.

Semas also won a \$100 Hearst award in January for editorial writing. He is the first University student to get two national awards since the contest was begun last year.

The foundation also awards matching grants to the School of Journalism, to be used as scholarships.

Payne Named To State Board

Ancil H. Payne, vice president and general manager of KGW-TV and Radio, Portland, has been named a member of the State Board of Higher Education succeeding John C. F. Merrifield, whose term expired.

Payne is a native of Mitchell, Ore., was raised in The Dalles and attended Willamette University, Notre Dame, Ohio State and the University of Washington. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa at the latter institution.

After serving as a Congressional assistant for four years in Washington, D.C., Payne was in business in Portland, Anchorage, Alaska, and Seattle before assuming the vice presidency of KGW-TV in July of last year.

He is married and the father of two daughters.

Mother's Death Calls President

Mrs. Harry S. Flemming, mother of University President Arthur S. Flemming, died Thursday at her home in Kingston, N.Y.

President Flemming has been at his mother's home since March 15. His mother was in a coma from that time until her death. She was in her 80s.

Funeral will be in Kingston. President Flemming's father died in 1958.
