with its own good judgment. This kind of decentralized control is not something to be discarded lightly. (In fact, it was expected that the Council would usually want their meetings open, but might on occasion want to go into executive session.) To deprive this particular committee of that option simply because it is composed of students as well as faculty members seems to be exactly the kind of patronizing of students which, all agree, should be avoided.

Clearly, if ASUO Senate members want to pack the vote for mandatory meetings in public, they have only to wait for an appropriate time when faculty numbers are reduced. (They might even find that faculty members favor the same course.) But if we must conduct our affairs on this campus while maintaining a war-like attitude, let no one suppose that there is any hope for men to do otherwise in the world-at-large.

Draft Tests Scheduled ...

Bowlin said students with high standing in their class would not gain from taking the test because they would get their deferment anyway based on their grades. Both Bowlin and Carter said those with good grades who do poorly on the test would still probably get deferments.

Those with low class standing would be aided in taking the test,

said Bowlin, because it would give the draft board another measurement of their ability.

Carter urged all college students who expect to be deferred to take the test.

Lt. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national Selective Service director, has said several times he believes college students will have to be drafted next year if draft lists continue to exceed 30,000 per month.

Heavy enlistments have cut the draft calls from 32,900 to 22,400 for March with an April call of 21,700. Enlistment totals have doubled over those of a year ago.

Student Call Unlikely

As long as those draft totals stay below 30,000 it seems unlikely that college students will have to be drafted.

The Army, anticipating that this situation might not last, has set up new deferment criteria in case Selective Service has to start withdrawing some deferments.

The new criteria:

- Completion of his first year of college in the upper half of the full-time male students in his class or scored over 70 on the test and has been accepted for the second year of study and has entered it.

- Completion of the second year of college in the top two-thirds or a score of 70 on the test and has been accepted for the junior class.

- Completion of three years of college in the upper three-fourths of his class or has a score of better than 70 and has been accepted for the senior.

- Completion of the fourth year in the upper three-fourths of his class or scored 70 or better and has been accepted for his fifth year of study in a course of study that requires over four years.

- Acceptance for admission or a degree by a graduate or professional school to the first class after he completes beginning requirements; and if in his last full undergraduate year he ranked in the top one-fourth of his class or scored 80 or higher on the test.

'Pilot' Center Names Hulteng

John L. Hulteng, dean of the University School of Journalism, has been named to the admissions committee of the Washington Journalism Center.

The center is offering \$2,000 fellowships to outstanding journalism students across the nation. The pilot program will begin this fall.

Students at the center will participate in seminars, internship programs, conferences, and research projects.
