faster than other State System schools.

He also said the Oregonian story was distorted by the fact that Guernsey used figures based on fall term student totals instead of the three-term average used by the State System.

In his story Guernsey cited these funds—per student—for the schools of the State System: the University, \$1,089; Oregon State, \$1,242; Portland State, \$789 Oregon College of Education, \$932; Southern Oregon College, \$770; Eastern Oregon College, \$1,000; Oregon Technical Institute, \$1,577; the University Medical School, \$4,164 per student; and the University Dental School, \$3,735.

The story said costs at OTI and the medical and dental schools had to be higher because of greater equipment expense. It also said that Oregon State's cost must be greater because OSU offers more courses in engineering and the sciences. Heavier graduate enrollments at the University and OSU are also reasons for their totals being higher.

At that time Lieuallen said that PSC and SOC were getting less than they should but that the State System was making an effort to rectify the situation.

Guernsey noted that as Portland State and SOC grow they continue to get worse off because they're getting less money for more students. He quoted PSC President Branford Miller as saying it means "the faster we run the behinder we get."

Shortages Noted

Guernsey's story said this financial shortage hurt all aspects of the education offered at these schools. He noted shortage in library books, and faculty assistants. He noted that both colleges have planning problems, yet can put less money into this area.

Lieuallen's new proposal on this problem will apparently include allotting funds to schools on a per student basis with students divided into three categories: lower division, upper division, and graduate.

Lieuallen noted that expenditures at Portland State have increased 123 per cent since 1955, while increases at the University and Oregon State have been only 36 per cent and 39 per cent.

He indicated that, using the full year average, Portland State gets \$296 per student, instead of \$453 as the Oregonian story said.

Board member J. W. "Bud" Forrester also noted that Portland State is getting \$800,000 in special funds to strengthen undergraduate courses and offer more graduate courses. He said the public is not generally aware of this.
