University Choir Sets Performance

Music from the Renaissance will be performed by the University Chamber Choir, directed by Neil Wilson, in a concert at 8 p.m. Sunday, in the School of Music auditorium.

Featured on the program will be madrigal and lute songs typical of Elizabethan and Jacobean music, three unaccompanied duets of Orlando di Lasso, and Bach's "Jesu, Meine Freude."

The Chamber Choir will also perform two selections from "Festino," a madrigal comedy by Banchieri.

Another work which will be presented is "L'Alouette," an example of several pieces which made Clement Janequin one of the most popular composers of the 16th century.

Solo artists who will perform with the chorale during the Sunday program are Guy Aydelott, tenor; Ralph Towner, lute and guitar; Jill Hardin, and Sandra Olsen, both sopranos; and Sylvia Thelen, and Howard Kennett, both on continuo. They are all students at the University.
