Bids Higher than Expected

The low bids for the construction of the University's Science Building are too high—about 18 per cent higher than was estimated in the budget.

A review of the costs will be necessary before any are accepted or rejected, said Jack Hunderup, director of facilities planning for the State System of Higher Education.

The low bids, submitted Thursday, totaled \$4,301,042, while the estimated total for these bids was only \$3,645,000. These bids

include costs for general construction, mechanical work, electrical work, and laboratory equipment work. Other costs will bring the complete total for the whole project up another \$1 million.

As a result of a recent fund approval by the State Educational Co-ordinating Council, the science annex qualifies for part of an additional \$1 million federal grant for eight projects in the State System of Higher Education. This means about 30 per cent of the total cost of these projects will come from federal funds. The rest of the money will come from the state.

The science annex will consist of a three-story laboratory

wing on the east end of the present Science Building, plus an adjacent underground science library on the west side. The completion date is Aug. 1, 1967 for the library, and Feb. 1, 1968 for the laboratory.

The apparent low bidders for the various contracts were:

- General Construction — Waldo S. Hardie & Son, Eugene, \$2,139,598.
- Mechanical work—Donahue and Fleskes Corp., Portland, \$1,176,463.
- Electrical work—L. H. Morris Co., Eugene, \$337,979.
- Laboratory equipment work —Permalab - Metalab Equipment Corp., Los Angeles, Calif., \$647,029.

Viewpoints being expressed by 'God Is Dead' theologians include: (1) The ideas of God we now hold are no longer relevant. (2) God died in Christ and the figure of Christ is to be emphasized. (3) God is the creation of man anyway, and we are just coming to realize this.

Duncan to Speak At SU Thursday

Donald Duncan, the Green Beret who attacked the war in Viet Nam in Ramparts magazine, will speak at the University Thursday.

Duncan, a much-decorated former sergeant in the U.S. special forces in Viet Nam, will speak at 8 p.m. in the Student Union.

He left the United States Army in September, 1965, after 10 years of service, including six years in the Special Forces and eighteen months on active combat duty in Viet Nam.

While in Viet Nam he received the South Vietnamese Silver Star, the Combat Infantry Badge, the Bronze Star, and the United States Army Air Medal. He was nominated for the American Silver Star and was the first enlisted man in Viet Nam to be nominated for the Legion of Merit. Both nominations are still pending.

He participated in many missions behind enemy lines in War

Zone D, Vung Tao and the An Khe Valley.

Last March he turned down the offer of a field commission to the rank of captain. Instead he left Viet Nam on September 5, 1965 and received his honorable discharge four days later.

He was the subject of a cover story in the March edition of "Ramparts" magazine. His speech is sponsored by the Student-Faculty Committee to Stop the War in Viet Nam.
