

New Coffee House Opens for Campus

A coffee house dubbed "The Womb" opened Friday night as one of the first projects by co-operating Christian student groups. The basement of Westminster House, 1414 Kincaid, was remodeled for the new coffee house.

The goal is not to establish a "religious coffee house," but to provide a meeting place for people with a common interest in world and university problems, backers say. "It should be a place to come, whether or not you consider yourself a Christian, where you can just talk," said Don Lanning, president of one of the sponsoring student groups.

The coffee house will also be

free to anyone who wishes to sing or read poetry. A stage is set up in one end of the room. Paintings and art objects will be welcome and plans call for a record player for anyone to use who has a jazz collection.

Coffee, of course, will be served, along with tea, sodas, and nut-bread.

"We call it 'The Womb,' Lanning explained, "because we hope it'll be the birthplace of ideas."

A campus minister, Robert Chastain, added another meaning for the name. "It may be a humorous recognition that some people think of the church as a shelter into which churchmen withdraw, much as 'into a womb.' "We don't have that in mind at all," he said. It's not a "religious coffee house and we hope the ideas will range beyond the solely religious or Christian.

Lanning agreed, "We want 'The Womb' to offer a setting for Christians and non-Christians alike to gather and through it to realize their share social concerns and can work together in many ways."

Hours at first will be limited to Friday nights, 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

YWCA Offers Service Projects

The Young Woman's Christian Organization is offering students a choice of four community service projects which they can sign up for from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Wednesday, in the YWCA office, Gerlinger.

The programs the YWCA is offering this term are these:

- Working with handicapped children, either the physically handicapped at the Children's Hospital or the mentally handicapped at the Pearl Buck School; teaching physical education to mentally retarded junior high students; or teaching swimming to the mentally and physically handicapped.

- Working with pre-delinquent youths through the Big Sister program.

- Working as a volunteer at Sacred Heart Hospital.

- Participating in "Project Progress," a program which consists of supervising and leading after-school activities with grade-school children of low income families in drama, art, recreation, and music. This program is especially interested in education, recreation, and PE majors.

All men and women students are eligible to participate in these programs.

Women's Honorary Calls for Petitions

Phi Theta Upsilon, national junior women's honorary, is now calling for petitions from outstanding sophomore women. Petitions may be picked up on the third floor of the Student Union and will be due April 13.

Interested sophomores must have at least a 2.75 cumulative GPA. In addition to scholarship, applicants are judged on campus activities and willingness to dedicate services to the University and to fellow students.

Phi Theta Upsilon functions as a service honorary on campus, hostessing and ushering for campus events. Members have raised money primarily through donut sales for a scholarship for a university woman.

Phi Theta will tap 25 new members at the Mothers' Weekend luncheon, Saturday, May 8.
