## Coming to Campus

## Shriver to See Festival, Attend Job Corps Meet

Office of Economic Opportunity Director Sargent Shriver and four members of Oregon's Congressional delegation, will probably attend a student-run discussion session on the Job Corps, planned for the University's Job Corps Center at Tongue Point.

Shriver will be on the University campus April 15 and 16 for the University's International Festival. April 16 he will attend at least part of a Student Union-sponsored Oregon Assembly at Tongue Point, according to Eddie Reyes, activities director of the Student Union. The group will continue on April 17.

Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.), will also definitely attend the discussions. Earlier this week, Morse, generally a supporter of

the "war on poverty," made several critical statements about the program.

### Green Might Attend

Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.), one of the most vocal critics of OEO, will also probably attend, though her plans are not definite as yet, according to Reyes. Reps. Robert Duncan, Democrat, and Wendell Wyatt, Republican, will also be at the Center.

The discussions will involve these people plus 35 other people—10 faculty and 25 students—from the University, 35 staff and Corpsmen from Tongue Point, and 20 students from Clatsop Community College in Astoria.

The two major addresses at the assembly will be made by University President Arthur S. Flemming and Tongue Point Program Director Harold McAbee. Shriver and the others will not speak but will participate in the discussions.

The title of the program is the "Job Corps and the Great Society." Among the questions they will consider are the race problems, difficulties with townspeople and other criticisms of the program.

### Flemming to Speak

Flemming will speak at 3 p.m., McAbee at 7:30 p.m. The rest of the day will be taken up with discussions.

There will be a general assembly the morning of April 17. Participants in the program will stay at the center.

Reyes said most of the faculty members and students have been chosen but not all have been named as yet.

The Student Union will also sponsor a Job Corps exhibition

on campus April 25. The SU will also sponsor a panel discussion on Private Line Three April 25 to discuss the Job Corps.

Reyes said that the Corps men will attempt to present exhibits in the SU which will give some idea of the way Tongue Point center is run.

## ASUO Leaders to Talk At 'Speakers' Platform

ASUO President Steve Goldschmidt will lead a student rally today to show that students want a voice in the decision-making processes of the University.

The rally, which will begin at 3:45 p.m. today, will be held at the Free Speech Platform on the Student Union Terrace.

Originally, the rally was supposed to coincide with the April faculty meeting, but University President Arthur S. Flemming announced Monday that he was postponing the faculty meeting one week. Despite the postponement, Goldschmidt will still lead the rally today.

Goldschmidt, ASUO Senators Henry Drummonds, Marvin Feuerberg, and Chuck Pruitt will speak during the rally, as will other students and faculty members.

Jim Hill, a freshman member of Young Americans for Freedom, a right-wing political club, has announced that he intends to conduct a counter-demonstration or "vigil-anti" during the rally.

The speakers at the rally will discuss student involvement in the educational process, including student suggestions for curriculum reform and an ASUO Senate request that the faculty vote to allow the ASUO President and one other student into faculty meetings in the future.

Flemming said Tuesday that he was sending out invitations to faculty members and students to serve on the Faculty-Student Council at once.

Last Wednesday the Faculty Senate voted to recommend to the faculty that the question of allowing the two students to attend faculty meetings in the future be referred to the Faculty-Student Council, a newly-established faculty committee.

## A Letter to Faculty, Students

ASUO President Steve Goldschmidt analyzes the factors surrounding today's student rally, inviting students and faculty members to participate.

The last four years have witnessed an increased participation in issues of local, national, and international significance by University of Oregon students.

Students attacked "in loco parentis" and worked with the faculty to establish the Student Conduct Code. Students developed a Migratory Labor Project—the first of its kind to be financed by a federal agency. Students began discussing, studying, and taking stands on issues like the South African Apartheid, HUAC, and Viet Nam. University of Oregon students involved themselves in this country's greatest social issues by going south as civil rights workers and by working in the slums of America's cities.

As on other campuses, students at the University of Oregon have also begun to investigate the problems of higher education. We have begun "lobbying" in the towns and cities of Oregon, as well as at the State Legislature, for increased support to higher education. The students have worked for a faculty evaluation process which will be implemented this year. We have established a Curriculum Committee which has drafted a dozen proposals for faculty consideration.

Student interest in the problems and processes of higher education is natural. Students realize, as do faculty members, that the future of higher education depends to a great extent on the quality of "lay" leadership developed by this state and its institutions of higher education. Unless students understand, participate in, and commit themselves to higher education, higher education may not receive the necessary tax support from the public in the future.

The rally scheduled for the Free Speech Platform at 3:45 p.m. today is a natural extension of the interest in higher education which many students have displayed throughout the year.

The rally is not intended to threaten the faculty or the administration of the University of Oregon. It is rather an opportunity for students and faculty to participate in a discussion of the problems of higher education confronting members of today's academic community.

In discussion with faculty members, I was surprised to learn that many thought the students were planning a demonstration, a sit-in, or other coercive tactics to pressure the faculty to accept the ASUO Senate's recommendation to allow two student representatives to attend faculty meetings. (The ASUO President and one other student.) Nothing was further from our minds. Instead this rally is intended to broaden the discussion which students will unquestionably pursue, relative to the future direction of higher education at the University of Oregon.

Likewise, some faculty members thought I withheld my appointments to the Student-Faculty Council as a means of pressuring the faculty into accepting the ASUO Senate's recommendation. This was not my intent. To this day, I have not received a formal request for student nominations to the Council, nor have I seen a copy of the faculty motion establishing the Council. I would also point out that the faculty appointments to the Council have not yet been made. To a large extent this may be the result of finals week, and the absence of both President Flemming and myself for over two weeks. I have now recommended to President Flemming my appointments for the Student-Faculty Council, as has the Faculty Committee on Committees.

In this letter I have not attempted to discuss the reasons why students should be allowed representation in faculty meetings; however, it is my hope that all other student-faculty grievances and misunderstandings will be set aside in an effort to facilitate the discussion of this one very important issue.

I look forward to a large student-faculty participation at today's discussion.

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## SU Hearings Continue, SDS Not Present

The Student Union Board went into its second day of hearings Tuesday with most of the discussions centering on responsibility to student opinion.

### Elected Body Should Control

Phil Semas, ASUO Senator and associate editor of the Emerald, said that since the SU board is a policy-making organization, an elected body should have some control over its functions. In this way, he added, the board would be more responsive to student views.

Art Tarlow, law student, said, "If we're reviewed by some other group, like the ASUO Senate, why not let them do the rest of our jobs? Why shouldn't we review our own actions?"
