

Peace Corps Applicants' Reception Set for Today

A special reception and informal discussion for University Peace Corps applicants will be held today in the Dads' room of the SU.

Applicants will have a chance to meet and talk with several Peace Corps Directors and volunteers: Ross Pritchard, Director of the Corps' Far East Region; Lenard Clarke, former Director in Sierra Leone; Kirby Jones, returned volunteer from the Dominican Republic; Peter Morris-

sey from Indonesia; and Charlotte Crawford from Pakistan.

A new color film, "Our Man in Borneo" will be shown at 7 p.m., and, following the film, at 7:30, a panel discussion will be held. Current issues and controversy relating to the Peace Corps will be topics: is the Peace Corps Volunteer an agent of American Foreign Policy? What is community development accomplishing in Latin America? What is the job of a Peace Corps teacher in Africa and in Asia?

The session will be open, and questions and comments from applicants will be welcomed. Applicants may meet the Peace Corps representatives informally after the discussion.

They will also be available in the Peace Corps Committee Office in the SU on Thursday for personal interviews concerning overseas assignments, training programs, or other matters of concern to applicants.

Peace Corps placement tests will be conducted at 9 a.m. Sat-

urday, Apr. 9, in Room 12 of the Eugene Post Office, 520 Willamette St. The tests are general aptitude tests, with a section on modern language aptitudes. They are used to aid the selection division in determining where the applicant could best be used.

Labor Project Applications Due

The Migrant Labor Project has opened its office to applicants for the 1966 summer project. The project, a University-sponsored program funded by the United States Public Health Service, will place approximately 30 students in four Oregon county health departments for summer work with migrant farm laborers.

To better prepare the applicants for their summer experience, the project is offering a three-hour course with regular University credit. Applicants are urged to register for this course, listed as Seminar, Education 407, with a term-line number of 5608.

The first class will be held from 7 to 10 p.m. today. "Bitter Harvest," a 15-minute film of 1964 Project volunteers in Yamhill county, will be shown during that time.

Project applications are available from 3 to 5 p.m. through Friday, in room 305 SU. The applications are due by Friday, April 15, and personal interviews will begin Monday, April 18. Final selection of volunteers will tentatively be announced by May 1.

German Economist To Speak Today

Current West German problems will be discussed by Herbert Wilhelm, prominent German economist, who will be a guest lecturer at the University today.

Wilhelm will give two public lectures today. At 10 a.m. he will speak on "Germany in the Common Market" in 3 Fenton Hall. His lecture at 3 p.m. in 138 Commonwealth Hall will be on "Public Welfare in Germany."

Wilhelm has been, since 1958, director of the Institute of Economics at the Academy of Technology in Brunswick, Germany. He received his doctorate from the University of Goettingen in 1948.

He has been closely associated with business and industry in Germany. He is consultant to the Industrial Institute in Cologne, a member of the Board of Advisors of the Advertising Industry in West Germany, and a member of the Research Advisory Board of the Institute for Industrial Research in Munich.

Wilhelm has published a number of books dealing with market research and a variety of economic subjects.

His lectures at the University are sponsored by the School of Business Administration. Both lectures are open to the public.

Roller to Speak On Art, Science

"Wood Block Artists and Science" will be the topic of the Browsing Room program, slated for 7:30 p.m. today in the Student Union. Duane H. D. Roller, of the University of Oklahoma will discuss the relationship between book illustrations and science in the 16th century.

Roller, McCasland Professor of the History of Science at the University of Oklahoma, is a visiting professor at the University for spring term.

Roller was chairman of the United States Delegation to the 11th International Congress of the History of Science, held in Warsaw-Cracow in 1965.

He has written a great deal on various subjects in the history of science. His books include "The Development of the Concept of Electrical Charge," "Foundations of Modern Physical Science," "The Development of Knowledge of Blood," and "The De Magnete of William Gilbert."

Articles by Roller have appeared in such publications as Science Teacher, American Journal of Physics, Physical Review, and Texas Journal of Science.

Discussion leader for the evening will be Robert W. Smith, professor of history at the University.

students, no representative body has control over its decisions. Thus nobody but the University president can override those decisions. He asked why the ASUO Senate should not have this power since they represent the students.

Eliminate Checks

Dick Lawrence, SU Board chairman, felt that this would make the board little more than an ASUO Senate committee. Tarlow added that such a system would eliminate checks and balances now in effect.

Semas, on the other hand, contended that review by the ASUO Senate would add checks and balances, and that as the board is now organized, there are none.

He added that the SU Board is the only administrative body on campus whose student members are not appointed by the ASUO president and approved by the Senate.

Finally, he said that all such administrative groups should be subject to review by some elective body.

"The State Board of Higher Education is basically the same kind of organization," he said, "and they are directly responsible to the Oregon Legislature."

The SU Board hearings will continue Thursday afternoon in the Student Union.

Bajer Receives \$95,300 Grant

A University professor, Andrew S. Bajer, has been awarded a \$95,300 three-year research grant from the National Science Foundation. He is an associate professor of biology.

The grant will allow Bajer to complete a research project in Sweden on cell division, the area of his specialization in biology.

Bajer left Eugene recently to consult with Professor G. Ostergreen at the Royal Agricultural College in Uppsala, Sweden. He will return to the University the first of June.

Bajer conducted seminars on "Studies in Mitosis" at Washington State University, Wayne State University in Detroit, Mich., and the University of Chicago en route to Europe, where he will also give seminars and confer with experts on cell division throughout the continent.

Job Opportunities

There are opportunities for teachers with the Summer Institute with full expenses at the University of Alaska, in conjunction with the Alaska Rural School Project. Mr. Darnell will explain the program in a group meeting at 3 p.m. today in the SU. The placement service will conduct individual interviews Thursday.

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WSI Course Now Being Offered

Students interested in obtaining American Red Cross certification in water safety instruction may enroll in a University class being offered through the Eugene Continuation Center.

"Swimming and Water Safety Instruction," PE 292, will be offered for two hours credit, beginning Tuesday, Apr. 12.

It includes analysis, methods of instruction, and evaluation at all age levels and is open to men and women students who pass qualifying tests in swimming and life saving.

The class will meet for ten weeks, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday evenings from 6 to 7 p.m., at Leighton Pool. Instructors will be Donald Van Rossen, University swim coach, and Jack Kelso, graduate assistant in physical education.

The registration fee of \$23.00 includes the towel fee. Persons who pass the necessary qualifying tests may register and pay their fees at the third meeting, on Apr. 14.

Med School Tests Slated for May

Admissions tests for students applying to medical college for fall, 1967 will be given May 7 and Oct. 22, 1966. Applications may be obtained from the biology office in room 361 Science.

A \$15 fee, which includes the cost of sending reports to six medical schools, is being charged. An additional \$1 is charged for each report over that number.
