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and because it is long over due," he said.

But Goldschmidt also said that "all this work will go for naught unless the group of concerned students gets larger than the number of students present here."

"Until the group becomes larger, the faculty will not listen," he said.

Goldschmidt described student involvement in the past four years, noting ASUO Senate stands on national and international issues, the Migrant Labor project, the Conduct Code, this year's

ASUO Poverty Conference, student participation in civil rights and the War on Poverty, and a faculty evaluation process.

He described the plight of the students at the University, using as an example the ASUO Curriculum Committee's proposal to make physical education required courses based on a pass-or-fail grading system.

PE Survey

A P.E. department survey taken this year showed that about 55 per cent of the students favored pass-or-fail. An ASUO survey, according to Goldschmidt, demonstrated that more than 80 per cent of the students favored the pass-or-fail system.

He said the P.E. department staff has claimed that the 55 per cent figure doesn't seem strong enough to warrant a change in the grading system.

Goldschmidt said that since the department wouldn't support the change, he went to the Faculty Curriculum Committee. The members told him they couldn't possibly support the change unless the P.E. department agreed to it.

"So, our only move is to the general faculty," he said, decrying "the hesitancy to move from within."

Disagrees Violently

Jim Hill, freshman in political science and member of Young Americans for Freedom, said: "I disagree violently with most of the statements made today."

"I don't agree that students have a right to sit in on faculty meetings. Students and faculty can work together, and faculty can represent student opinions in faculty meetings as well as students," he said.

Hill was supported by Ed Davis, also a freshman in political science and member of YAF. Davis said students do not have a right to "run the University." He said the rally was designed "to build up the egos of the student leaders, or maybe some students hope

it will turn to a Berkeley situation."

Spencer Block, graduate student in counseling, then took the stand, saying that he represented only himself, and asked for a voice for the students. "I don't want to run the University. I want to partake in it. I want a voice."

"The educational system is outdated," Block said. "The faculty doesn't really quite know the direction to take. We have to help them. But first we may have to demand the right to help."

But YAF member Skip Wall said that he doubted if the faculty "has the right" to allow stu-

dents into the faculty meetings, "without first checking with the voters."

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accept your interpretation of what you agreed to."

"It means just what it says: that we'll assist," Nielsen said, "but that doesn't mean the county will go over there and spend a lot of money on access roads."

"The University hasn't said you'll have to," Flemming replied.

Nielsen and several other members of the council also asked for definite plans on the stadium. But Flemming said he couldn't answer those kinds of questions until more definite planning has been done by architects. Architects so far have only done siting studies and developed a general stadium concept. Preliminary plans have not yet been drawn up.

He said the University intends to build walkways to make it easy for students to walk to the North Bank, cutting down on the parking problem.

"You have a river, a railroad, and Franklin Blvd. to cross," Nielsen pointed out.

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
