'Project Progress' Helps Through Personal Contact

Project Progress is designed to "give children an opportunity to establish personal, individual contact with University students" according to Melody West, project chairman.

The program, sponsored by the University YM-YWCA, began in October. Last term about 75 children from Whiteaker Elementary School were enrolled in the project.

University students may learn more about Project Progress at the booth in front of the Student Union today and may sign-up for the project at the YWCA office in Gerlinger Hall.

Students are needed to work in recreation and the fine arts with these children from lower income homes. "We work in small group situations so the children can learn to relate to adults without being told what to do," explained Miss West.

"We are not authority figures; we play and work with them; we don't specifically teach anything or tell them what to do."

The purpose of Project Progress is to give the children personal attention and to encourage individuality. The children are

given a chance to be creative and to express their originality in constructive ways.

University students are needed to work on Mondays and Wednesdays in recreation and field play and on Tuesdays and Thursdays in drama, music, folkdance, arts and crafts, storytelling, and "anything else we happen to think of," according to Miss West. The sessions are held from 3:30 to 4:30 each afternoon.

During winter term the children took field trips to museums and to plays, received trampoline lessons, worked in arts and crafts, and played baseball and football. Miss West hopes to expand the program this term if enough University students volunteer their time.

Project Progress has obtained its own building in the Whiteaker area. The children are planning to do most of the work in setting up the building, but University students are needed to help.

"These kids are really gung ho," said Miss West. "Many of them earned their own money in order to attend the International Festival next weekend."

Some of the children in the project are from broken homes

or have other problems, but mostly they are just "normal kids" explained Miss West. We do need men for the program, she continued, especially to work with the boys who do not have fathers.

Project workers hope to have more weekend activities and field trips this term. One possibility is an all-day camp out, so the children can learn to build fires and cook outdoors.

The remarkable thing about the Washington team is that they depend so much on one person: senior high jumper, broad jumper, triple jumper, sprint man, hurdler, you - name - it Dave Williams.

Williams has not won any NCAA championships, but marks like 6-6 in the high jump and 54.5 in the 440 intermediate hurdles are certain to win most meets. Undoubtedly, he will hurt the Ducks in two of their weakest events—the broad jump and triple jump.

There are several bright notes for the Oregon track team though neither of these will necessarily help their cause on Saturday.

First, senior distance runner Bruce Mortenson will see action for the first time since his rugged trip to Morocco during spring vacation.

Second, junior sprinter Jim Wood, recovering from what was thought to be an attack of kidney stones, started to workout this week though he definitely will not be ready Saturday.

And third is Bob Blum who will compete — though possibly not in the hurdles — in spite of the foot he injured in a fraternity water-fight last Sunday.

UO Soccer Sets All-Star Contest

Oregon's next soccer opponent will be selected Saturday at Corvallis when 22 all-star candidates from three teams compete for 11 berths on the Oregon Intercollegiate Soccer Association all-star team. Oregon, undefeated OISA champion, will meet the all-star team in Eugene April 16.

Second place OSU will enter 11 players in this week's playoff, along with seven from Lewis and Clark and four from University of Portland. Reed College joined the league last month but will not compete outside of exhibition games until next season.

Placement Service Offers Opportunities

Anyone who has watched the "Job Opportunities" column in the Emerald can surmise that the job-market for graduating students is active. The University Placement Service reports feverish activity with a daily average of eight campus recruiters during January, February, and March.

Students who are actively seeking employment have registered with the Placement Service and are able to present personal, educational, and occupational information to employers at time of interview.

There are definite benefits resulting from registration even though immediate employment is not sought. By registering with the Placement Service, students assemble in a permanent file the occupationally-significant data about themselves and secure statements from professors at a time when the professors and administrators remember them best.

Seniors who undertake graduate work at other institutions are eligible to secure placement assistance from the University Placement Service at any time. It is, therefore, advantageous for them to establish a file before leaving.

Registration papers may be secured at the reception desk in the University Placement Service, second floor, Susan Campbell Hall. The service is free to graduating students and to returnees from the services.

UO Grad Offers Journalism Contest

The John Valleau Civil Liberties Award for the best paper written on some aspect of civil liberties will be offered this spring at the University for the second year.

All undergraduate University students are eligible to enter the competition by submitting papers of not more than 20 pages in length. Entries should be submitted to Dean John L. Hulteng of the School of Journalism by May 16. Judging will be by a panel of University political science and journalism faculty members.

The award, which carries a stipend of \$50, was established last year by John Valleau, Jr., a graduate of the University's School of Journalism.

Wiley Exchange Applications Due

Applications for national teaching fellowships for exchange teaching at Wiley College, Marshall, Tex., are now available and must be returned to Room 231 Hendricks Hall today.

The fellowships are open to primarily doctoral candidates and instructors and carry a stipend of \$6,500 per academic year, plus \$400 per dependent.

All eligible departments are urged to participate in the program, viewed as a unique experience for doctoral candidate training.

The program is being financed under the 1965 Higher Education Act, Title III.
