Counseling Grant Over \$140,000

Grants totaling \$142,552 have been received from the U.S. Office of Vocational Rehabilitation to support the graduate program in rehabilitation counseling at the University during the present fiscal year.

The program, headed by Martin H. Acker, associate professor of education, has received increasing federal support for about the last ten years. The program began in the 1956-57 academic year.

The grants provide a number of graduate students with tuition and trainee stipends in a two-year program leading to a master's degree. The program is designed to train students as counselors in state or private agencies dealing with the problems of physically and mentally disabled persons.
