

Foreign Policy Assembly Topic

Daniel L. Horowitz of the U.S. State Department will be the speaker for the University Assembly today.

Horowitz will discuss "Dilemmas in American Foreign Policy" during the public assembly at 8 p.m. in 150 Science. While at the University, he will also speak to several classes.

A foreign service officer (Class I) with the State Department, Horowitz studied at New York University and received a Ph.D. degree from Harvard University.

His most recent diplomatic assignment was at The Hague, Netherlands, where he was counselor for political affairs at the American Embassy. Prior to that, Horowitz' service included assignments at American embassies in Paris, New Delhi, and Santiago, and in the State Department's Bureau of European Affairs and the National War College.

Horowitz has also been a lecturer at Harvard University and has held various positions in New York state and federal governments. His book, "The Italian Labor Movement," was published by the Harvard University Press in 1963.

For the current academic year, Horowitz has been assigned to the University of Kansas as a visiting lecturer and diplomat in residence. He is one of six foreign service officers assigned to American universities for the 1965-66 academic year, the second year of this new State Department program.

Group to Present Choral Works

University vocalists and instrumentalists will present the Northwest premiere of the most significant of early Baroque sacred choral works on Saturday in Portland, and April 23, in Eugene, conducted by David Farr.

The performances of Claudio Monteverdi's "Vespers in Honor of the Blessed Virgin" or "Vespers of 1610" will be at 8 p.m. Saturday at St. Stephen's Episcopal Cathedral in Portland, and 8:30 p.m., April 23, at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in Eugene.

Farr is a teaching assistant in music from Coquille. Presently organist at St. Stephen's Cathedral, Farr has also served as choirmaster and organist at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Eugene for two years.

Enrollment Figure Climbs to 10,963

Spring term enrollment for 1966 shows a 17 per cent increase over the 1965 spring term enrollment. The registrar's figures for the first two weeks of the term report a total of 10,963 as compared with 9,405 enrollment for the same period last year. This spring there are 6,663 men students and 4,300 women students at the University.

There are now more graduate students at the University than any of the four other classes. The graduates number 2,680, a 26 per cent increase in enrollment over last spring term.

There are 2,094 in the senior class—an 8 per cent increase over the 1965 spring term. The smallest class at the University is the junior class with an enrollment of 1,724, a 10 per cent increase over last spring.

The sophomore class numbers 2,102—a 17 per cent increase over last spring; and the freshman class reported an 18 per cent increase over last year with a total enrollment of 2,243.

Comparing this term with the 1966 winter term, there is an approximate 4.5 per cent decrease in total enrollment. Total enrollment for winter for 1966 was 11,484, as compared with the lower spring enrollment of 10,963. A decrease in enrollment as compared with the winter term was reported by the freshman, sophomore and junior classes, and the graduates. Only the senior class reported an increase in the number of students over their winter enrollment.

The freshman class reported the biggest decrease in enrollment, losing 401 students, approximately a 15.1 per cent decrease from winter term. The class with the next highest decrease was the junior class, which reported a 4.8 per cent drop.

Veto Power

Senate to Discuss Bill Amendment

An amendment to a bill, recently brought before the ASUO Senate, to give the Senate veto-power over policy decisions made by the Student Union Board, was passed by the ASUO Public Affairs Committee Tuesday.

The proposed amendment, which would delete the substance of the clause, "within 10 days," will be brought before the Senate at its next meeting.

The bill, as it now reads, gives the Senate the right to review any policy decision made by the SU Board, "within 10 days" of the adoption of the decision. The bill further states that if the Senate reverses a policy decision of the Board, that reversal stands, until, or unless, President Flemming overrules the reversal.

The bill was tabled at last Thursday's Senate meeting. It will be discussed, along with the amendment, at today's Senate meeting.

ASUO senators present at the Public Affairs meeting generally

agreed that the amendment is necessary so that the Senate can review policy decisions, which may not have been known to Senate members, within 10 days after they are passed by the Board.

The Senate initially adopted the bill to give a student-elected body (the ASUO Senate) a veto-power over policy decisions made by the SU Board which might not be in the best interests of University students. Members of political groups and senators at the meeting generally agreed that the Senate is the most representative body on the campus.

Most senators, campus political representatives, and Board members at the meeting agreed that the SU Board should remain a selected (non-elected) body, because knowledge of the Student Union and the Board's administrative tasks is almost essential before a student can become a Board member. If Board members were elected, it is possible that many candidates would know little, if anything, about the Board's structure and functions, several students at the meeting reasoned. The Board would become more an instructive body for new members than an administrative body.

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Concert to Feature Tartini, Mozart, Ives

Compositions by Tartini, Mozart, Ives, and Brahms will be featured during a student recital at the University School of Music auditorium at 8 p.m. today.

The recitalist will be violinist Donald Heard, senior in music. He will be assisted by pianists Catherine Henke and Mrs. Winifred Swaim, both of Eugene.

Heard is concertmaster of the University Symphony Orchestra and has been a member of the Salem Junior Symphony Orchestra.
