the advisability of approving the student request centered around the Emerald. Several faculty members voiced concern over the possibility of the student other than the ASUO president being an Emerald representative.

Other faculty members worried that passing the ASUO Senate's request might be the "first step" in the direction of completely open faculty meetings.

The student request was granted after hearing a report from Robert Horn, chairman of the Student-Faculty Council and professor of English. Horn told the faculty that the Council had voted unanimously to recommend approval of the request.

Two amendments were passed by the faculty. These were also suggested by the Student-Faculty Council.

They were:

- In the absence of the ASUO president, the ASUO vice-president can attend the meetings.
- At each meeting, one other student will be appointed by the president of the University on the nomination of the ASUO president.

Six notices of motion were presented at Wednesday's faculty meeting, including the Faculty Senate's recommendation to open faculty meetings to the public.

All of the following will be placed on the agenda for next month's faculty meeting:

- A motion to institute a pass-or-fail grading system for non-physical education majors taking P.E. courses. This comes from the ASUO Curriculum Committee.
- A move to allow departmental autonomy in offering substitute programs for one of the language reading requirements now demanded for all doctoral candidates.
- A recommendation that the preliminary version of the minutes of faculty meetings be made available to the press.
- A motion that the number of student representatives allowed to participate in faculty meetings be equal to the number of ASUO senators, with these representatives being elected at the same time as the senators are elected. These students will have all of the same rights as faculty members, including a vote, according to the author.

It was originally presented during the discussion of the ASUO Senate's request and offered as a substitute motion. Flemming ruled in "not germane" and the faculty agreed when the president's ruling was challenged.

- A motion to guarantee the right of anonymity for faculty members who participate in the meetings when students are present. This is designed to keep student representatives from reporting on the personal feelings of individual faculty members, as expressed in faculty meetings.

The faculty also approved a broadcast policy.

The motion reads in part: "The faculty of the University believes that, under the appropriate supervision by the faculty and administration, the use of broadcasting at the university level can be a valuable and useful supplement to the educational process."

ceptance of the plan and a concern that many students might think the University was throwing the students a "sop."

Flemming and several members of the committee emphasized that the students were free to pull out of the University program at any time and that, though the University would not publish the evaluation, the students would be free to do so.

Flemming noted that the original suggestion to develop a program of faculty evaluation for use in promotion and tenure decisions came from the faculty Advisory Council.

Leo pointed out that he had consulted with about 120 faculty members before the final form was developed.

The form consists of a section that gives data on the student such as class and grade point average; questions on lectures, reading, examinations, and the student's reaction to the professor; and written comments on the course.
