"I see no ominous forebodings of oppression (of the Board) by the Senate," Drummonds said. He pointed out that President Flemming would still have final authority, and that the bill itself is only a request.

Lee Bollinger added, "It's not who built the SU that's important here. It's the fact that the decisions of the Board are affecting the students. 'We're asking for a chance to express the opinions of our constituency.' Beat added his feeling that the argument for the 'competency of the Board' was 'grossly over-emphasized.'"

"I personally talked to three Board members who felt that operations would be facilitated by placing tables all around the terrace — yet the Board voted overwhelmingly against this."

Final Vote

The final vote on the motion was 14 yes, five no, no abstentions.

The recommendation for the power of review will be taken to President Flemming some time in the near future.

The Senate also passed a resolution providing for fulfillment of vacancies left by senators who resign before the expiration of their term. These would be filled by whichever senate candidate received the next lowest number of votes in the general election (below the resigning senator).

The succeeding senator would serve out the remainder of the term left to him, even though he was scheduled to serve a short term himself. (Senators receiving fewer votes are often slated for shorter terms.)

The Senate also approved the appointment of five students to the new Faculty-Student Council, the "channel of communication"

between the student body and the University faculty.

Appointed

The five — Bill Camp, Marvin Feuerberg, Bob Holmes, John McCarthy, and Dave McClosky — were all recommended by ASUO President Steve Goldschmidt. They have sat on the Council since its inception, as temporary members, until the final appointments were confirmed.

In other business, the Senate approved the dates set by ASUO Vice-president Tom Clark for the ASUO elections: the primary will be held May 4, the general election on May 11.

The Senate also adopted the following proposed constitutional amendments as its by-laws:

- That no member of the ASUO shall concurrently hold, or be a candidate for, more than one elected office or position included in the ASUO budget;

- That the International Student Representative shall be chosen from the international student group;

- That Freshman men's and women's dorm representatives shall be elected fall term and hold office until the end of spring term of the following year;

- That Ex Post Facto laws pertaining to the ASUO Constitution are invalid;

- That the vacancy of any office elected under the Constitution shall be filled during the next election, with the exception of the ASUO President and class president, which shall be filled by their respective vice-presidents.

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He added that whenever colonialism departs from a country, it is succeeded by an artificially-created division, such as the split between the Indians and the Pakistanis.

Rossides said that he hopes the "will of the people" will prevail, and there will be no outside interference in Cyprus, "in accordance with the General Assembly resolution, recently passed, which calls on all nations not to interfere in the affairs of Cyprus."

Rossides called the admission of Red China to the United Nations inevitable, although it poses many problems, because "one-third of the people living on this globe must be represented."

He said that the prestige of the U.N. is improving and that "silently and undramatically a great deal has been done," especially in the economic and social areas. But, he continued, if the U.N. has not achieved its main purpose—"world peace brought about by reason, instead of force"—"it is not the fault of the United Nations but of those who compose it."

Summer Workshop Offers Dance, Hockey

Activities ranging from contemporary dance to field hockey will be featured in a special summer workshop in physical education at the University this year.

The three week workshop on secondary school and college physical education will be held from June 20 to July 8. Workshop coordinator is Jessie Puckett, associate professor of health and physical education at the University and member of the workshop's resident faculty.

Sections in gymnastics, track and field, contemporary dance, folk dance, archery, tennis, badminton, field hockey, basketball, and bowling will be offered for both beginning students and those with high degrees of proficiency.

A special feature will be a working laboratory on creative aids for high school teachers.

Three guest faculty members have been announced for the workshop. They are Mrs. Carolyn Osborn Bowers, Ohio State University; Mrs. Maxine Rowan, Thomas Jefferson Junior High School, Eugene; and Donald Thompson, officer and workshop director with Oregon Folk Dance Federation, Salem.

Mrs. Bowers was a competitor in gymnastics from 1956 to 1964 and a first alternate on the 1960 Olympic team. She also qualified for the Olympic trials in 1964.

Resident faculty members include M. Frances Dougherty and Janet Woodruff, professors of physical education at the University.

Additional faculty members will be selected.

Room and board for workshop participants will be available in University dormitories. Information about dormitory living expenses may be obtained by writing the Director of Housing at the University.

Workshop fees will be \$28 for 1-2 hours and \$14 for each additional hour. Workshop classes may be combined with graduate courses for students working toward advanced degrees.

Is Your Child College Material?

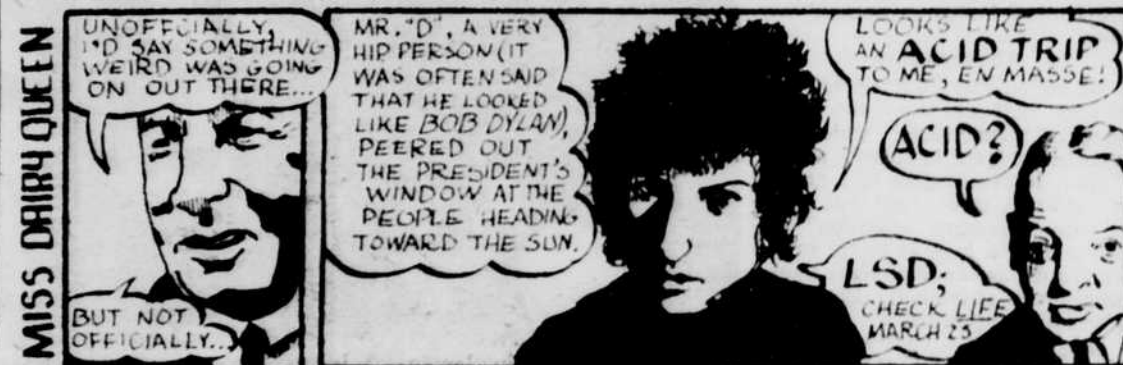
That depends. By today's standards, he probably is. By standards ten years from now, perhaps not. How can that be? Is his I.Q. likely to change? No. But conditions are.
