Soccer Team Ties All-Stars, 2-2

The Oregon soccer team, with a late goal by halfback Peter Hole, came from behind Saturday in an Oregon Intercollegiate Soccer Association all-star contest and earned a 2-2 tie with the OISA all-stars on the intramural field.

Oregon scored early but lost its lead to the OISA team composed of Oregon State and Lewis and Clark players.

Webfoot forward Aaron Chipaunga opened the scoring after five minutes of play, but Lewis and Clark's Ray Sock tied the contest for the all-stars at the 37-

minute mark. Five minutes later Oregon State's Sam Mbele-Mbong put the visitors ahead, 2-1, on a penalty kick.

The only second half score was the game-tying effort by Hole. The former Cambridge University captain booted the ball from outside the penalty area and over the head of all-star goalie Sam Nee of Lewis and Clark. Hole later placed another long kick in the nets, but the score was disallowed because it violated the indirect kick rule.

Hatfield Attacks Policy Of Viet Nam Involvement

SALEM (Special)—Gov. Mark O. Hatfield attacked American involvement in Viet Nam Friday night and urged citizens and students to speak out their opinions. Hatfield was the keynote speaker for the state convention of the Oregon Republican College League. "A Voice of Dissent" was the theme of the two-day conclave.

The statement that individuals do not have enough information to discuss the war and should leave it to the President and other officials is "a mockery of our system of government," Hatfield said.

"People in the office are not immune to error and misjudgment," he continued. "Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara's statements present a mirage of confusion."

Hatfield condemned the United States' involvement, saying: "Americans often forget that other portions of the world have a history of their own. Any situation is more complicated than our motives alone."

The idea that the guerilla fighters do not have popular support is sadly mistaken, according to Hatfield. "The Viet Cong support the peasant and identify with him; they could not have gained their position by terror alone." He called the conflict a civil war.

"Force must have a moral and politically sound base for its use. The United States must walk a narrow line between power politics and democratic freedom," said Hatfield.

"We cannot continue to interject ourselves into other countries' affairs," he continued. "There are not enough Americans to maintain the status quo."

Then the governor commented on the purpose of the war. "To win a war we must be able to set a fire in the minds of the people, give them something they can understand. But we fail to have a set and well-defined cause."

In keeping with the convention theme, Hatfield discussed the role of dissent. He called it a

"creative and positive force which when properly given will assist in the discovery of truth and lead to national alternatives."

Hatfield quoted former Supreme Court Justice Learned Hand, saying: "The right to dissent is one of the fundamental reasons this country is worth defending. It is the soul of the nation, part of the force which makes it great."

In conclusion Hatfield urged the students to "commit yourselves to open and free discussion without fear of retaliation."

Smith's time in the century was a blazing 9.2 but was disallowed because of a 5.4 mph trailing wind, just .9 mph over the allowable limit. In the 220 he clocked 21.0 for an easy win.

Smith Wins Jump
He went to the broadjump pit for just enough time to make one attempt and the 23-10¼ effort was good enough for first place. Smith anchored the Spartans to a 39.9 clocking in the 440 relay and that raised a few eyebrows. It was reported that a lot of amateurs had the winning time anywhere from 40.7-41.0. This caused Cal coach Sam Bell to comment, "I don't know what happened, but I'm sure the time is wrong."

But it will stand as a record for the meet and the stadium as all three officials clocked the last runner at 39.9. This also represents the second fastest time on record for this event.

Cal ran away from the field in the mile relay for a 3:10.0 win with SJS record in 3:16.8, and the Ducks third with an 3:17.3.
