

Activities Committee Revises Policies

During a joint meeting with several ASUO Senators, the Student Activities Committee again revised its projected policy draft, a compilation of all rules relating to student activities at the University.

One of the changes approved at the Thursday meeting dealt with administrative procedures an already recognized local student group should use when it wants committee approval to affiliate with a national organization, student or otherwise.

A request for affiliation must be turned in to the Committee along with other information, including the local membership roll. Several senators objected to including the membership list.

John Moore, senator-at-large, objected to the list because it would be on file and open to the public. He said that the membership lists should be secret in

order to protect students.

A. L. "Si" Ellingson, committee member, said that he was opposed to secret lists for many reasons. First, he said that the "University is prime grounds" for people who would like to use public property for private, front organizations.

"Protection In Advance"

Also, he said he felt that secrecy—"protection in advance"—is contrary to the principles of free speech and academic freedom that the University stands for.

But the committee accepted a recommendation from ASUO Vice President Tom Clark that the membership lists be destroyed annually.

Donald DuShane, dean of Student Affairs, and a committee member, said that his office destroys student affairs records after a student has graduated.

The Committee also clarified

a policy regarding the use of the Free Speech Platform. According to the revised statement, anyone who wishes to do so may use the platform—whether or not he is a member of the University community.

Printed Material

W. P. Rhoda, committee chairman and a professor of physical education, said that this had always been the policy of the committee but that several people had suggested that the section be re-worded.

The Committee also revised the section in the policy draft dealing

with the dissemination of printed material on campus. Until now, all printed matter had to have the name of the sponsoring student organization printed on it. The Committee changed this section so that now all printed material must bear the name of the responsible organization.

Identification Necessary

Ellingson said that the section had been "unnecessarily strict" in some cases. The important thing, he added, is that all material be identified.

The revision, he said, will enable the campus CORE to use material from CORE national headquarters without stamping "Campus CORE" all over it.

A change in the scheduling of "paid events" was also approved by the Committee. Until now, any student organization wishing to schedule an event for which admission would be charged had to have the co-sponsorship of the Student Union Board.

Now that the policy has been changed, a group may petition either the SU Board or the Student Activities Committee for permission to present a paid event.

According to Ellingson, this

means that the SU Board will not have to sponsor or co-sponsor an event—it can just give a group permission to schedule the event.

This change must also be approved by University President, Arthur S. Flemming.

The committee granted recognition to the Campus Liberal Organization and the UO Folk Music Society.

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Schuyler to Discuss Communist Plots

George Schuyler, Negro journalist from Pittsburgh, will speak at 8 p.m. today at Sheldon High School.

Schuyler, brought to Eugene by the Emerald Empire Speakers' Bureau, will discuss "The International Communist Conspiracy."

Schuyler is associate editor of the Pittsburgh Courier and a contributor to the North American Newspaper Alliance, which serves hundreds of dailies. In these capacities, Schuyler has traveled extensively throughout the world.

The author of two novels, "Slaves Today" and "Black No More," Schuyler joined the Courier staff in 1924. He has contributed stories to a number of periodicals, including American Mercury, National Review, Negro Digest, and others.

Schuyler has taken stands opposing many of the current civil rights tactics in the past.

Tickets, at \$1.25 for adults and \$1 for students, will be available at the door. Sheldon High School is located at 2455 Willakenzie St., Eugene.
