

Budget Revisions Made by Board

The Student Union Board slightly revised some budget proposals for next year before approving them in its meeting last Thursday.

These budgets must still pass two budgeting committees and receive President Arthur S. Flemming's approval before they can be considered final.

The budgets approved were for the various committees of the SU, the SU Board itself, and the Summer Session program. The different committees received money as follows:

The Personnel Committee, \$1,415; the Publicity Committee, \$2,835; the Recorded Classics Committee, \$260.

The Jazz Appreciation Committee was allotted an increase of \$5,035 from both its original and revised budgets for the current year. This huge increase is to allow the committee to bring three or four big name jazz performers to the University next year.

Increases in the budgets of other committees are for new programs, or expansion and improvement of old ones, plus the rising cost of materials. Decreases are due to programs

which were dropped, or programs which were cut to keep their cost in proportion to their value. The remaining programs and their allotted funds are as follows:

The Arts Committee, \$3,360; the Forum Committee, \$3,675; the Talent Committee, \$274; the Movie Committee, \$4,315; the Dance Committee, \$2,020; the Games Committee, \$2,530.

The SU Board was allotted \$7,530 for administration, an increase of \$5,506 from its original administration budget for the current year, but an increase of \$5,386 from its revised budget for the current year. The increase here is for salaries for the board chairman, recreation council chairman, the directorate chairman, and another Student Affairs secretary.

The SU Board was allotted \$310 for travel, a decrease of \$190 from its original travel budget for the current year, but a decrease of \$290 from its revised budget for the current year.

The Summer Session Program was allotted \$6,325.

Many of the programs' expenditures will be offset by the income they will bring. The income budget and three budgets will be discussed at the SU Board meeting this week.

Debaters Take 3rd

The University won third place in four-man debate at the national Delta Sigma Rho-Tau Kappa Alpha college forensics tournament, held at the University of Nevada in Reno, April 11-13.

The four-man team of Gregory Mowe and Gary Roberts, affirmative, and William Lawrence and Joann Johnson, negative, represented the University at the tournament. The team recorded a total of 12 wins and four losses in both affirmative and negative debates.

Oregon's negative team of Lawrence and Miss Johnson tied for first place among negative teams competing in four-man debate. They will participate in the National Invitational Debate Tournament at West Point, April 21-23.

Nine of the 38 teams which will compete in the West Point tournament took part in the Reno competition.

The University's affirmative team debated four of the teams which finished in the top five places in the Nevada tournament. They finished with a record of five wins and three losses.

In individual events, Gary Roberts reached the finals of extemporaneous speaking and tied for fifth place out of more than 60 entries in that event.

Gregory Mowe was one of four students to be elected to the national student council of Delta Sigma Rho-Tau Kappa Alpha.

Stations Offer Gas Discounts

Horowitz Says

'NATO Problems Focus on France'

Daniel L. Horowitz, a foreign service officer who spoke on American foreign policy last Thursday, discussed the current problems on the North Atlantic Treaty Organization Friday.

Horowitz stated that "France, personified in De Gaulle, is the focus for the range of problems in NATO."

The loss of her colonies after World War II "represented a traumatic experience for France," Horowitz said. "This has meant, for a proud people, the groping for a place in modern society."

"De Gaulle still feels bound by the North Atlantic Treaty," Horowitz hastened to add. "It is the alliance organization which he objects to."

However, he added, that not all the problems originate with France. A shift in the position of the Allies has also created misunderstandings.

European countries no longer consider themselves first rate powers, Horowitz said. "They identify with our interests, yet do not feel direct responsibility, since we are the principle world power."

Problems have also arisen within the NATO structure, he continued. The major ones are military strategy and nuclear management. Horowitz explained that

the European countries are regaining their self-confidence. They now want partial management of NATO.

Horowitz went on to explain that NATO has lasted this long because it is not a classical alliance organization. Most such alliances "fall apart when the pressing problems for which they were formed have passed," he said.

NATO was evolved for defense. "It represents the effort to deter aggression from the East and it has worked," he said.
