## Students Gripe

### New Constitution Due SOC Faculty

ASHLAND (AP)—A new faculty constitution will be drawn up at Southern Oregon College.

The Faculty Council, which resigned last week, met Monday with Elmo Stevenson, school president, to discuss the matter.

It was decided that the faculty would select a group to draft a faculty constitution. For the time being, the college will operate without one.

The council had resigned last week, the 13 members complaining that their suggestions were not being followed.

No date has been set for the new faculty guidelines, but Stevenson said he hopes they will be drawn up in time for the next school year.

He said he thought the present guidelines were out of date.

Stevenson added that the council resignation indicated that the school was "passing through one of those trying periods that occurs in the life of a fast-growing institution."

"We have all been so busy handling immediate problems that we have lost touch with each other," he said.

Meanwhile a student group met to coordinate gripes. A campus-wide meeting will be held at a date not yet set, but already students have pointed to two complaints: The library is inadequate and needs emergency measures even though a new one is planned; and faculty salaries are too low.

Last week the students got into the disagreement the faculty had with the administration by hanging an effigy of Stevenson. When they tried to hang a second, another student group set upon the first and a general fight followed.

## Poetess to Read Her Own Works

Poet Mona Van Duyn, editor of the literary quarterly "Perspective," will give a public reading of her poems today.

The poetry reading is set for 4 p.m. in the Student Union. It is sponsored by the University's department of English, the Northwest Review, and the Division of Continuing Education.

Miss Van Duyn is a faculty member of Washington University in St. Louis. A number of her poems have been published in "Poetry" magazine and other literary publications.

Poems by Miss Van Duyn have been assembled in two volumes, "Valentines to the Wide World," published in 1959, and "A Time of Bees," published in 1964.

A New York Times reviewer

concluded that the poet's work was "full of verbal and metaphysical wit, a wiry distortion of ordinary speech."

Miss Van Duyn's appearance in Eugene is part of a Northwest Poetry Circuit program of the Academy of American Poets.

## Viet Nam, Laos to Get Summer Project Aid

Any male U.S. citizen, 21 years of age or older, currently engaged in graduate studies, may give his services to the people of Viet Nam or Laos in a special summer project.

The Agency for International Development (AID) has authorized a project to be administered by the International Education Center (IEC) in which 40 young men will have an opportunity to serve in Viet Nam or Laos in a civilian capacity from June 16 through approximately Sept. 1, 1966.

The purpose of the project is to help Viet Nam and Laos im-

prove the capacity and effectiveness of their programs at the provincial level in such fields as rural reconstruction, refugee assistance, supply distribution and community development.

Some 30 volunteers will be assigned to Viet Nam and ten to Laos, where they will assist local government officials in carrying out welfare or development programs under the over-all direction of a Team Leader employed by the IIE, and in association with the provincial representative of the U.S. AID Missions.

The campus office of the International Education Center is handling the project at the University.

Applications and information may be obtained from 3 to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday at 312 SU. Application deadline is Monday.

## New Grant to Aid Work - Study Plan

The University has been allotted \$494,31 for the next fiscal year for its student-study program. This will allow students to have part-time work to help complete their education.

The allotment was made by the U.S. Office of Education for the period from July 1, 1966, to June 30, 1967. About 400 students at the University will be working on campus jobs under the program, according to Howard Ramey, University director of financial aids.

Under the program, the federal grant pays 90 per cent of the student wages, and the University departments pay the other 10 per cent. Students participating in the program must have a financial need and be making satisfactory progress toward graduation.
