

IFC Plans To Help Finance UO Rugby Team

Joe McKeown, president of the University Sigma Chi chapter and Interfraternity Council Tribunal chairman, said at Tuesday's IFC meeting that with the reinstatement of the Stanford Sigma Chi chapter that the racial discrimination issue at Stanford is "very substantially improved."

McKeown also said that he hoped that the Stanford chapter's reinstatement "would further enhance the position of the Oregon chapter of Sigma Chi, as well as that of the entire Greek system at the University, as far as the discrimination issue is concerned."

The IFC's executive vice president, Bruce Morrison, related the organization's plans to help finance the combined Oregon-Oregon State rugby team which will tour England this summer.

About \$20,000 is needed for the tour, Morrison said. The U.S. State Department may contribute, but the IFC is planning to sell buttons which will be used for admission to a dance in May. The IFC will pay for the band and provide a fraternity house for it.

Other IFC business included the announcement that 25 Tongue Point Job Corps trainees will visit the University next Monday and Tuesday. They will be housed at various fraternities.

IFC President Warren Houston said that the IFC representatives are available to speak at organizations and that the four elected officers will hold office hours daily in the IFC office in the Student Union.

Houston's office hours will be from 1 to 2 p.m.; McKeown's from 2 to 3; Morrison's from 3 to 4; and Secretary-Treasurer Bill Piche's from 4 to 5.

Dormitory Pigeon Takes First Place

Hale Kane's pigeon placed first in the fifth annual pigeon race held Sunday in connection with the White Water Boat Parade. The winning pigeon, owned by Ed Sandgathe, averaged forty miles an hour to cover the 45 mile flight from the McKenzie River to its home loft.

Out of 191 pigeons three other University pigeons placed within the top 22. Alpha Omega Pi's pigeon came in 11th; Alpha Gamma Delta's came in 20th; and Caswell's pigeon finished 22nd.

The profit from the race this year was \$810. It will go directly to the Children's Hospital School. The project usually averages \$1,000.

Physics Professor To Visit Germany

Gregory H. Wannier, professor of physics at the University, has been invited to spend the next three months in Munich, Germany, as a visiting professor at the Institute of Technology. He will teach solid state theory at the Munich institute from May 8 through July 30.

Swiss-born Wannier says that for the first time in his career he will be teaching in his native language. Previously he has taught in both English and French.

Following the Munich assignment, Wannier will go to Russia, where he has been invited to participate in the International Conference on Low Temperature Physics, to be held in Moscow Aug. 31 through Sept. 5.

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Hulteng to Attend Journalism Confab

John L. Hulteng, dean of the University's School of Journalism, will be in New York and Washington, D.C., April 22 to 28 to attend a series of professional meetings.

In New York, he will meet with members of a joint committee on journalism education of the American Newspaper Publishers Association and the Association for Education in Journalism. Dean Hulteng is co-chairman of the committee. He will also attend a meeting of the American Association of Schools and Departments of Journalism, of which he is vice-president, at Columbia University.

Dean Hulteng will be in Washington, D.C., to sit as one of the five-member board of admissions of the Washington Journalism Center, a newly-established institute for graduate study and research in the nation's capitol.

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
