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Beebe also said that the program is presently suffering from a lack of tutors.

Senator-at-large Henry Drummonds reported that the Public Affairs Committee had discussed—and was still discussing—a proposed Senate statement of opinion on the Viet Nam crisis this week. Drummonds said that another open hearing will be held next week, to air still more dialogue on the proposal.

Tom Clark, ASUO vice president, reported that University President Arthur S. Flemming has made no decision on acceptance of bills dealing with review of policy decisions made by the SU Board, but that the Senate may review such decisions, within a period of 15 days—during which the Senate would usually meet twice.

The Senate also passed a resolution, proposed by sophomore representative Scott Farleigh, in which the Senate endorses "... the goals of the Tongue Point Job Center . . .," as stated by the Center, and "... the coming Job Corps Exposition."

### Exposition Held

The exposition will be held next Monday and Tuesday at the University.

Lee Bollinger, co-ordinator of the recently-begun ASUO student discount program, reported that the program—now limited to gas and auto service discounts—is doing well. The four stations involved in the program have reported a 25 per cent business increase every day since the program's inception.

## Museum Friends To Attend Dinner

The annual gourmet dinner of the Friends of the Museum, statewide organization for support and promotion of the University Museum of Art, will be an event of the coming week.

The dinner meeting, which will feature an after-dinner address by internationally-recognized architect Pietro Belluschi, will be Wednesday evening, in the Student Union.

Following the dinner, which is featured by unusual gourmet dishes, a reception will be held at the Museum of Art in honor of Belluschi.

Tickets for the annual dinner-meeting are available through the office of the Museum of Art at \$7.50 per person. The dinner is open to members of the Friends and their invited guests. Membership in the Friends of the Museum is open, at \$10 annually, to all interested persons.

Following completion of business, Senator-at-large Chuck Pruitt spoke, to rekindle enthusiasm for the Senate's bill of February 24 requesting an investigation of all University living organizations for racial discrimination.

"I don't think we can let it go at that," Pruitt said. We should all think of what can be done to broaden the attack on discrimination."

"The campus is inclined to single out one scape-goat with regards to discrimination," he continued. "But we didn't pass the bill to get rid of one house. We may get rid of Sigma Chi, but we won't necessarily get rid of discrimination. We have to make sure what we pass is done."

ald DuShane, to call the omission to the attention of the group is all that is needed.

Another paragraph concerning exception policies contained in the draft was also approved.

"Exception to, or waivers of those policies and procedures contained within this statement, which originated with or for which the Student Activities Committee has responsibility, may be granted by the Student Activities Committee upon petition."

### Footnote Added

A footnote was also added to the draft: "... It should be noted also that changes in policy which have originated with a source other than the Student Activities Committee but through delegated authority of the committee, but cannot be accomplished directly by it, except by action which would, in effect, return such delegated authority to the committee."

In other business, the committee also granted recognition to the following groups: SWINE (Students Wildly Indignant About Nearly Everything), the Latin-American Students Association, and the Co-operative Christian Ministry Co-ordinating Committee (Christian House, Canterbury Club, Luther House, Newman Center, Wesley Foundation, and Westminster House).

The Fellowships for Exceptional Students are designed to aid and encourage young men and women to prepare for leadership roles in industry and society. The award provides a \$750 grant for each candidate.

## Haverford Faculty To Open Meetings

HAVERFORD, Pa. (AP)—Haverford College doesn't expect to end "revolutions" among students on campus, but it said Tuesday it hopes to make them a little less bitter with a new plan for student participation at faculty committee meetings.

The college announced a plan to permit two students, appointed by the students' council, to sit as active participants on each of eight faculty committees concerned with academic and campus affairs.

Religion professor Gerhard Spiegler, a member of the education policy committee, who backed the proposal, said, "we are not aiming for tranquility, but we do hope we can eliminate some of the unnecessary venom."

He added, noting that some faculty committees meet almost weekly, that "it is one other recognition that students are not 'merely children' but that they have rights as members of the academic community."

James Friedman, a junior from New York City, said the plan "probably will liven things up a bit," adding, "if nothing gets done it will be partly our fault."

Haverford is an undergraduate liberal art college for men. It has a student body of 525.

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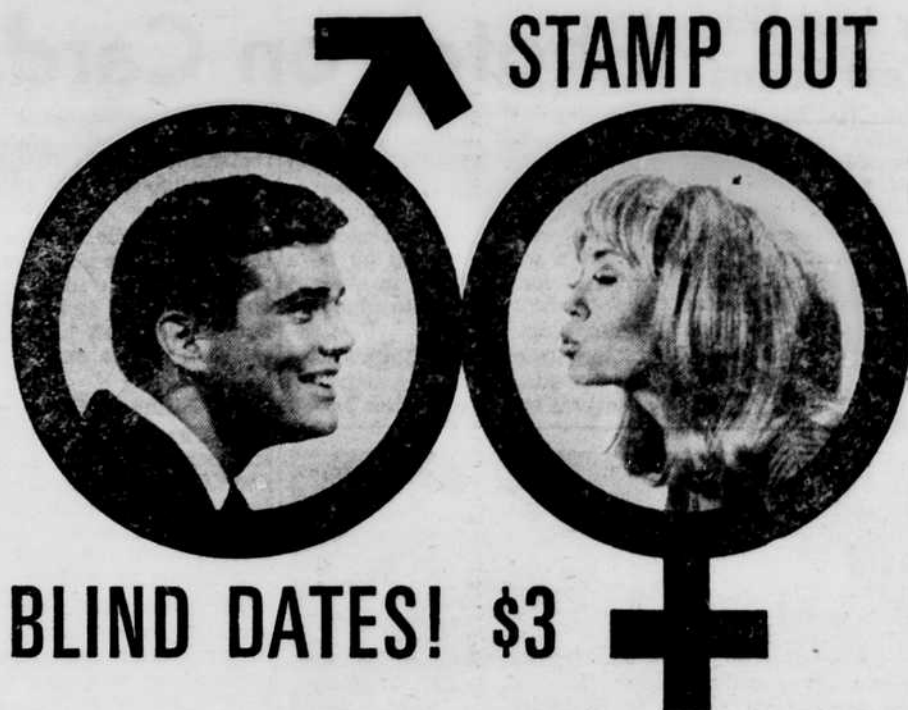
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
