

Mt. Angel President, Pierson to Lecture

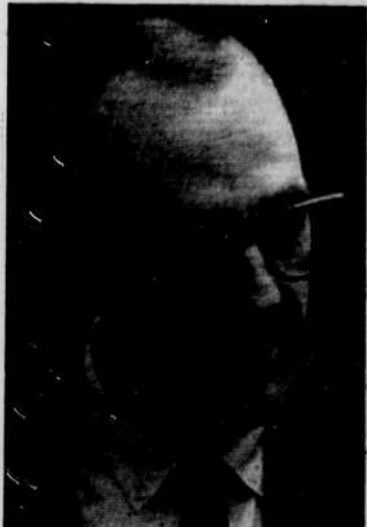
The president of Mt. Angel College and a professor of history at the University will attempt to define "the educated man."

Exhibit Opens At Museum

An exhibition of the year's acquisitions by the Museum of Art at the University will open Wednesday.

The opening of the show coincides with the annual dinner-meeting of the Friends of the Museum and provides members and guests with an opportunity of seeing how Friends' funds have been used to build the permanent collection of the Museum.

An impressive display of paintings, sculpture, drawings, prints, and pottery is included in the new show—representing the largest and most significant group of acquisitions ever made in a single year through the support of Friends of the Museum membership.

Gifts during 1965-66 by individual donors are included in the exhibition.

The exhibition will be on view through May 1.

Continuing also through May 1 will be the exhibition "Art for the World's Religions, organized in conjunction with Religion and Culture Week at the University.

Hours at the Museum are from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday; 1 to 5 p.m. Wednesday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday. The Museum is closed Monday.

Hates Dorm Life

Radcliffe Coed Places Ad Seeking One-Year Hubby

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — The Harvard boys are lining up for interviews with a Radcliffe girl who says she wants to get married for one year to escape dormitory life.

Only married students at Radcliffe College can live off campus, so to get around the regulations she has placed this advertisement in the Harvard Crimson:

"One-year marriage? Seems to be the only way for a Cliffe to get out of the dorm. I'll share expenses, am a good cook. Other details? We can work it out. Contact Crimson box 2000."

So far 13 eager boys have snapped at the offer to try to work out the terms of the proposed one-year marriage.

Richard Appleby, 20, of Great Neck, N.Y., replied by mail, "You sound interesting. Maybe we can work something out."

He said he would wait until he

had a chance to meet her before deciding whether to accept the offer. He added:

"The trouble with American marriages is that we don't have enough practical experience . . . maybe this sort of thing is just what we need."

The Radcliffe girl declined to identify herself because she did not want "a whole bunch of nuts calling me."

"I just want to live off campus and earn my degree in history," she said, because it's "quieter there and I can get more work done."

She said she has blue eyes, auburn hair and is five feet tall.

"I really want a roommate, not a husband," she said, "but he's got to marry me to satisfy Radcliffe."

Eric Tomb, 20, of Cleveland, Ohio, a junior, also answered the ad in the student newspaper, and commented:

"I'd been planning to put an ad in myself for a female roommate. A girl that can cook and and there might be other fringe benefits . . . like washing my socks."

Wayne Jones, 21, of Wayne, Mich., said he answered the ad because he wanted to meet a girl with "that kind of a sense of humor."

The Radcliffe student said Wednesday "I really didn't expect this great harvest. Now I'll have to weed them out, eliminate those who don't understand the point of all this and then interview the rest."

She said she placed the ad as a "kind of joke" to protest the Radcliffe regulations.
