

Rule Violators Dismissed at Berkeley

BERKELEY, Calif. (CPS) — Two University of California at Berkeley students charged with violating campus rules on non-student organizations were dismissed from school and a third was placed on disciplinary probation last week by Chancellor Roger Heyns.

Between 13 and 16 other students charged with violating the same rules will have a public hearing before a faculty hearing official this week.

Michael Smith, 25, formerly a senior in political science, and Steven Hamilton, 21, formerly a senior in history, were dismissed effective immediately. Both would have graduated in June.

Paul Glusman, a freshman in letters and sciences, was placed on disciplinary probation until the end of the semester.

Second Time

This is the second time Heyns, who took over as Berkeley chancellor last October, has dismissed students for violating university rules. Earlier last week he announced the dismissal of graduate student Susan Stein for refusing to abide by the terms of her disciplinary probation.

Miss Stein was placed on probation after a faculty hearing officer found she had violated rules by speaking at an illegal Viet Nam Day Committee rally during the registration week for the current semester. She then refused to attend a weekly meeting with

the dean of women, required of all women on disciplinary probation.

Hamilton and Smith were charged with illegally manning the Peace/Rights Organizing Committee table on four occasions last month. The organization does not qualify as a student group since it has some non-students on its executive committee; therefore, it is not allowed, under the campus rules, to set up a table on campus.

In addition, the two were found to have given a "contemptuous and insulting refusal to desist"

Survey Made On Recreation

Jack Cross, associate director of the Student Union, is conducting a survey on student views on the question of on-campus recreation space.

Students who want to fill out a questionnaire can pick one up between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. in room 301 or 304 in the Student Union. The questionnaires will be available until April 26.

Cross is also conducting another survey with the form. He sent it out to 131 students on a random sample. He said Wednesday that 37 had been returned and urged that all students who received the questionnaire in the mail return it.

when directed to cease manning the tables by a university official. They were charged with both "obstructing enforcement of campus rules and encouraging others to do likewise, leading to acts of extreme rudeness and even rowdyism." Both refused to show university officials their registration cards when asked to do so.

Glusman, who was only placed on probation, had manned the table only once but had refused to leave the table when asked to do so by a university official. He did show his registration card when asked.

Followed Recommendations

Heyns' decision followed the recommendations of the Faculty Committee on Student Conduct which had considered the three cases in late March. At that time the students walked out after the committee refused their demands that there be an open hearing, that all students charged with violating the same rule be heard together, and that the committee question the constitutionality of the rule under which they were charged.

The dismissals have created relatively little talk on the Ber-

keley campus. One possible explanation is that most students were away for Easter vacation at the time the last two were dismissed and only returned to campus during the weekend. Still, there has been little talk of the dismissals on the campus, several students reported, even though it is generally known that they took place.

Lone Reaction

The lone student reaction seems to be that from a delegation of 14 that marched to Heyns' office just hours before Hamilton and Smith learned of the chancellor's decision. These students presented a list of demands concerning the three students. In-

cluded was a "complicity list" signed by 48 people demanding equal punishment for others who said they had broken the same rules and a petition from W. E. B. DuBois Club protesting the citations.

The group was not able to meet with Heyns, however, and left after leaving their names with his secretary.

Hamilton and Smith will have to get special permission to re-enter the university, as both said they hoped to do. In addition, Smith will lose a Work-Study Program job as a physical education instructor at a Berkeley elementary school since he is no longer a student.

Student Receives Music Fellowship

A University music student, Marlyn Potampa, has been awarded a \$2,400 Bella Zellerbach Cross Fellowship.

Miss Potampa will use the fellowship for graduate study in music at the University of California at Berkeley. She will receive a bachelor of music degree in June from the University.

The fellowship winner has studied piano for three years

under Francis W. Bittner, associate professor of music at the University. She also studied piano with Herrn Hartman while an American Field Service student in Germany.

She is the past president of the University's chapter of Mu Phi Epsilon, international music sorority, and a member of Mortar Board, senior women's honorary.
