

Hui O Kamaaina to Present Annual Hawaiian Luau

Hui O Kamaaina, the University's Hawaiian club, will hold its annual Hawaiian Luau Sunday in the Auditorium Building at the Lane County Fairgrounds. The dinner will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Lane County Fairgrounds. The dinner will begin at 6:30 p.m. and the program at 8:30 p.m.

Tickets for the dinner and program are \$3 and may be purchased at the Student Union desk or at Bronson's Travel Service. Anyone wishing to attend the program only may obtain tickets for \$1 at the door.

The Luau menu will feature some of the traditional island favorites: Kalua Pig (roast pig); Bar-B-Q meat (beef soaked in soy sauce with onions, ginger, salt, aji-no-moto and sugar); Chicken Luau (cooked with taro leaves in coconut milk); Lomi Lomi Salmon (shredded, salted salmon served with tomatoes and onions).

Other Hawaiian foods will be poi, an island staple made from the root of a taro plant; baked sweet yams; and the traditional dessert, Haupai, of coconut and sugar. Fresh pineapples and pineapple juice will also be served.

The entertainment will include songs and dances by groups and



soloists. Master of ceremonies will be Harold Iseke, the choral director for the program. The choreographer is Carol Kaulakui.

Some of the special numbers will be the Maori Stick Game, a Knife Dance and a Tahitian dance.

The soloists will include Cheryl Eto, singing "Lei of Stars"; Carol McIntyre and Lei McCormick in Holo Holo Kaa; Harold Iseke sing-

ing with the chorus "I'll Remember You"; Robert Luersen, with the chorus, "Ain't No Big Thing," Carol Kaulakui dancing "Mi Nei" with Harold Iseke and Betty Heinrich singing a duet.

Hui O Kamaaina, the sponsors of the annual Luau, was formed at the University by Hawaiian students who wished to share common interests and to acquaint the people of Oregon with a culture that is unique to Hawaii.

Behavior Study Symposium Set

"Behavior Modification — Applied Settings" will be the topic of a day-long symposium scheduled for Tuesday at the University.

Speakers will be Morris Haring, director of the Experimental Education Unit at the College of Education, University of Washington, and Gerald Patterson, associate professor of psychology at the University.

Moderator will be Oscar C. Christensen, assistant professor of education at the University.

Graduate students and staff members of five University departments — education, psychology, anthropology, and philosophy — and other interested persons are expected to participate in the symposium.

The event is sponsored by the Psychological Services Division of the School of Education. It will begin at 8:30 a.m. in the Dads' Room of the Student Union and continue through the afternoon following a noon break.

Both speakers have done extensive research in the area of behavior modification.

Haring has focused much of his work on the subject of exceptional children.

He is chairman of the Educational Services Committee of Task Force II, unit on Education of Crippled and Other Health Impaired, for the special needs branch of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and has written a number of books and articles in this area.

Patterson has also been interested in the behavior modifications of children. He has served as president of the State Child Guidance Association, is currently a member of the Board of Psychologist Examiners for the State of Oregon, and was on the committee which prepared a report to a 1958 State Legislature interim committee on the emotionally disturbed child.

He is currently working with Richard A. Littman, head of the University department of psychology, on a project studying learning theory and the socializa-

tion of the child. The five year project is financed by an \$81,000 grant from the National Institute of Mental Health of the U.S. Public Health Service.

The public is invited to attend the symposium free of charge.

Another symposium is scheduled for May 27 by the Psychological Services Division. It will concentrate on "Theoretical Bases."

Puckett Presides Over Northwest Conclave

Professor to Give Lecture on Galileo

Italian scientist Galileo will be the subject of two public lectures by Duane H. D. Roller, visiting professor of history, today and next Monday.

Roland, McCasland professor of history of science at the University of Oklahoma, will consider "Galileo and Beauty: The Making of a Scientist" during his 8 p.m. lecture today. Next week Roller will discuss "Galileo vs. the Professors and Inquisition." Both lectures will be in 123 Science.

Roller received his B.A. in history of science from Columbia University. In 1949 he earned an M.S. at Purdue in experimental physics. At Harvard, Roller received a Ph.D. in the history of science and learning.

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Lecture to Cover King Midas' Home

Archaeologist C. H. Emilie Haspels, the Charles Eliot Norton lecturer of the Archaeological Institute of America (AIA) from 1965-66, will discuss "Phrygia, the Land of King Midas" at 8 p.m. today in 106 Lawrence Hall.

Miss Haspels's lecture will deal with a region in the interior of the Anatolian peninsula which is now modern Turkey. The region was once inhabited by Phrygians whose most famous ruler was King Midas.

The Phrygians were Indo-Europeans who swept across the Hellespont into Asia Minor about 1200 B.C.

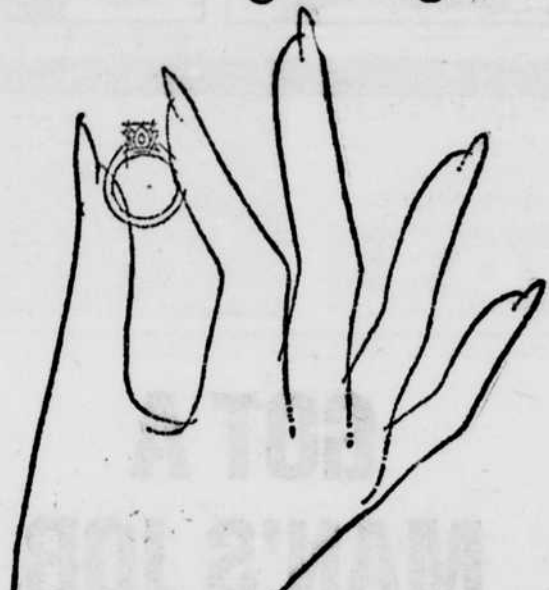
King Midas was probably a real sovereign of the Phrygians,

but many legends have been built around him. He has been mentioned by a number of classical writers such as Herodotus, Virgil, Cicero, and Plutarch. The most famous legend appears in Ovid's "Metamorphoses" in which King Midas is given "the touch of gold."

Miss Haspels, a professor of classical archaeology at the University of Amsterdam, was field director at Midas City during the Phrygian expeditions of the French Archaeological Institute. She has published many reports and a book of the Phrygian expeditions.

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
