Saturday's crowd of 7,500 gave fine support to the Oregon trackmen. The cheers for miler Wade Bell in his losing effort continued even after it was obvious he was out of contention.

And the roar that came out of the stands when Ken Moore made his move on UCLA's Geoff Pyne was one of the loudest heard in quite a while.

But the crowd might not have been quite so vociferous if they had known that they were keeping Neil Steinhauer from besting his own shot put mark.

"I felt good," explained Steinhauer, "but the crowd turned me on too much. I just got too excited. Usually it's to your advantage, but it was too much. I guess I'm still just a kid."

Oregon fans were surprised at the Webfoot success in the long jump, thought to be the team's weakest event. Bob Woodell, who sat out last year's competition, won the event with a leap of 23-11, while Duck Herman Brame was second at 23-10, both all-time personal bests.

Woodell gave all the credit to Brame. "He changed my whole approach. He helped with it and really did the job. He's the guy that really did the good job."

Brame explained the new Duck success this way, "We saw that our steps were bad, by the time we got to the board we were going so slow we might as well have been doing pop-offs. Now that we know what's wrong we'll be able to get out there all the time."

A visitor to the Oregon dressing room after the meet would probably have thought that the Ducks had pulled off a stunning upset. The Webfoots were happy and laughing, acting not at all like a beaten team.

Part of this might be explained since no less than 12 Ducks established seasonal bests against the Bruins.

Pole Vaulter Bob Varley and sprinter Mike Debele, in addition to the long jumpers, proved to be the surprise boys of the meet. Varley, competing against the best collegiate vaulter in the nation in Marc Savage, went 15-feet. His previous best was only 14-6.

Debele surprised everyone in the stadium with his 9.6 clocking in the 100-yard dash. His previous season's best was a slow 9.9, a time which earned him no better than a fourth place on paper.

● Bob Varley became the first 1966 Webfoot to go over 15-feet in the pole vault with an effort exactly on that height. Dennis Keller managed a 14-6 to equal his lifetime best.

The pole vault also provided a good deal of the late afternoon excitement. Uclan Marc Savage, who holds the collegiate record of 16-9 won the event at 16-2, then missed three times at 17-½.

● Ken Moore culminated the Oregon victories by hanging on Geoff Pyne's heels for seven laps during the two mile, then sprinting past him to win the event by 50 yards and in the best-ever time of 8:44.2.

Steinhauer Surprising

Steinhauer's effort in the discus surprised more than just the Oregon section of the field.

UCLA's discus specialist, Dave Weber, who had a 176-foot effort going into the meet—only a few inches behind Steinhauer—had nothing but praise for the Oregon weightman after the affair was over.

"I'm not going to touch him in the PACs or in the NCAA," Hale said. "And I'll have to improve fantastically if I do next year."

Correction Emerald Editor:

The article on marriage counseling which appeared in Friday's Emerald left the impression that I officiate at inter-faith wedding services. You quoted me as saying, "There would be no disabilities in performing such a marriage, if at least one of the persons involved is Jewish." I don't know how you arrived at this. It is completely untrue.

I have told you and others who have inquired, I am a rabbi, a leader and teacher in a specific religious tradition. For religious services, I do not minister to people outside this tradition. Marriage is a religious service. Consequently, I do not perform marriages unless both parties are Jewish.

Since this is my position, clear and unequivocal, I don't see how you could have arrived at any other conclusion.
