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tions and by using surplus grant funds the project could be completed within the new limitations.

Hunderup said that at least \$200,000 will be realized in federal grant money beyond what had been planned for during the last biennium. He also said that the State System will possibly get another \$750,000 to \$1 million in surplus grant funds.

About \$2 million of the science project is being financed from National Science Foundation grants.

Rising costs came up often as the Board surveyed some other construction projects planned for the state-operated schools. Bids for a \$1.2 million library at Southern Oregon College were also high, 22 per cent over expenditure limitations.

J. W. Forrester, Jr., vice-president of the Board, said he felt the State System was going to run into many problems when it takes its next biennial building program to the 1967 Legislature.

H. R. Bork, vice-chancellor for business affairs, said that rising labor costs, extended union contracts, and rising material costs were causing prices to rise faster than was expected when some preliminary planning was being

done.

Several architects at the meeting also said that it was "anyone's guess" as to when prices would level off.

Federal grants for planning are also harder to get. The Board voted to use \$350,000 from student building fees and income from auxiliary enterprises for planning since many projects are being held up due to shortage of funds.

The Board will begin work on its 1967-69 construction program this summer for presentation to the next legislature.

Other Board action included:
 • Approval of an application for federal planning funds for the University's proposed Law School and Legal Center. The project, to cost \$3.1 million, is scheduled for presentation to the 1967 Legislature.

Advising Set On Fall Schedules

All undergraduate students who plan to return to the University at the undergraduate level next year are reminded that they should see their academic advisers during regular office hours now through May 13 to plan their programs of study for next year.

The early advising conference replaces the one normally required before enrollment in registration week of fall term. A student who completes his advising conference now will be ready to enroll in courses and complete registration in the fall just by showing his completed "List of Selected Courses" signed by his adviser.

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• Authorization for the University to purchase six plots of land next to Agate Street to complete the East Campus Urban Renewal Project.

• Approval for the University to buy a piece of property at 1791 Alder Street for possible future use as a site for a parking structure. The house now on the

property will be used as an annex to the Music School.

• Approval of preliminary plans for a 126-student dormitory at Oregon College of Education for the 1967-69 biennium.

• Authorization for a contract award for a \$3 million library at Portland State College. The library, to occupy 111,000 square

feet, will house 420,000 volumes.

The Board also passed a resolution officially naming the coliseum at Oregon State University for the late Amory T. "Slats" Gill, former basketball coach and athletic director at OSU.

The Board meeting continues today on the campus of Eastern Oregon College in La Grande.

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SU Purchases 18 Photographs

Seventeen black and white photographs and one color photograph have been purchased by the Student Union at the University from the 1966 Pacific Northwest Art Annual exhibition which will be held through May 21.

The Art Annual for 1966 includes the work of Northwest photographers. It was opened Monday in the SU Art Gallery with a public gallery reception from 8 to 10 p.m., honoring the participating photographers, particularly the photographers whose works have been purchased for the permanent collection of the Student Union.

The 1966 exhibition of photography is the sixth Pacific Northwest Art Annual sponsored by the SU Board, which established the annual invitational show and art acquisition program in 1960.

The works purchased through each show represent the artists of the Northwest and the various creative media of the region. These works are permanently displayed in the Student Union.

The SU now has in its permanent collection five oil paintings, three water colors, two drawings, one tempera, five pieces of sculpture, seven prints, and the new photographic collection.
