Symposium to Discuss Behavior Modification

"Behavior Modification — Applied Settings" will be the topic of a day-long symposium today at 8:30 a.m. in the Dads' Room of the Student Union. The symposium will continue through the afternoon following a noon break.

Speakers will be Morris Haring, director of the Experimental Education Unit at the college of education, University of Washington, and Gerald Patterson, associate professor of psychology at the University.

Moderator will be Oscar C. Christensen, assistant professor of education at the University.

Both speakers have done extensive research in the area of behavior modification.

Haring has focused much of his work on the subject of exceptional children.

He is chairman of the Educational Services Committee of Task Force II, unit on Education of Crippled and Other Health Impaired, for the special needs

branch of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and has written a number of books and articles in this area.

Patterson has also been interested in the behavior modifications of children. He has served as president of the State Child Guidance Association, is currently a member of the Board of Psychologist Examiners for the State of Oregon, and was on the committee which prepared a report to a 1958 State Legislature interim committee on the emotionally disturbed child.

He is currently working with Richard A. Littman, head of the University department of psychology, on a project studying learning theory and the socialization of the child. The five year project is financed by an \$81,000 grant from the National Institute of Mental Health of the U. S. Public Health Service.

The public is invited to attend the symposium free of charge.

McFee to Head Art Association

June K. McFee, director of the Institute for Community Art Studies in the School of Architecture and Allied Arts at the University has been elected president-elect of the Pacific Regional of the National Art Education Association. The Pacific Regional is comprised of ten western states, including Alaska and Hawaii.

McFee will hold the office of president-elect for two years prior to becoming president of the Regional. The office includes a four year term on the Board of the National Art Education Association. At the end of her term as president, the Pacific Regional Conference will be held in Oregon.

Peace Corps to Schedule Campus Placement Tests

University students will have an opportunity to take the Peace Corps Placement Test on campus Saturday. It will be given in room 52 Education at 8:30 a.m.

The Peace Corps needs 10,500 new Volunteers to enter training between now and next fall for service in 46 developing nations of Latin America, Africa, and Asia. The Placement Test is designed to help the Peace Corps match applicants' special abilities with the 300 different kinds of jobs to be filled. If the test indicates a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.

The application form (Volunteer Questionnaire), rather than the Placement Test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Students or others available for service or advance training within the next year must fill out a Volunteer Questionnaire before taking the test. The Questionnaire, which is submitted to the tester, can be obtained in advance from the International Education Center in room 312 of the Student Union.

The Placement Test takes about half an hour. An optional French or Spanish achievement test requires another hour. Both tests are non-competitive and require no preparation. A completed

questionnaire is the only prerequisite for the test.

The Peace Corps is also sponsoring a movie at 7:30 Wednesday, "Mission to Discovery," in the SU. Room number will be posted. A discussion will be held following the movie, in which several Peace Corps Volunteers will relate their experiences and answer questions from interested students.

Students may inquire further into the Peace Corps by checking the list of all University students now in the Corps, which is outside the International Education Center, room 312 of the SU. Names and mailing addresses of all these volunteers are available from the list.

The Corps is now offering a junior year program, whereby college juniors may obtain Peace Corps training during the summer period to their senior year. They may then return to school and graduate, and, after taking refresher training, enter the Peace Corps.

They may also take regular University courses which supplement the training, such as a foreign language or history course.

There are 13 programs offered, each for a different nation, and there are many openings in each. Information on these is also available in the International Education Center.

Schleicher Wins Fulbright Award

Charles P. Schleicher, professor of political science at the University has received a Fulbright Award to work in India during the remainder of 1966.

Schleicher leaves immediately for Bangalore, where he will be director of a seminar on American institutions and culture during the month of May. Following that he will be a visiting research professor of International Relations at the Indian School of International Studies in New Delhi.

The grant is the third Fulbright Award for work in India to be given Schleicher, who has previously been professor of international relations at Allahabad University in 1954-55, and lecturer at Delhi University in 1962-63.

During the coming months at New Delhi Schleicher will be primarily engaged in conducting a research project on Indian foreign policy.

He has previously served on two occasions in a directing capacity for a Seminar such as the one he will direct in Bangalore in May.

Schleicher will be on leave from the University until January, 1967.

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
