

Autonomy Needed...

We want something both more and less than what is currently available. We want more languages and greater proficiency in those languages. In this sense, we suggest an obstacle of greater consequence than that defended by opponents to change.

We want languages from Africa, from the Middle East — from Asia and Southeast Asia; we want the ability to use these languages—not simply the ability to take an examination and forget what we "learned." We want less in that we may not need two languages to accomplish our specific goals.

Must Depend on Need

The specific configuration of the "language requirement" should depend, first, on the needs of the graduate student and, second, on his discipline. In history, for example, it may be appropriate to become proficient at reading three languages or at speaking, reading, and writing one and being able to read two others. It is also conceivable that no languages are necessary—that some other ability is much more relevant to the specific needs of the graduate student.

The appropriate locus of this decision is the graduate student and his department—not the Graduate School. Therefore we want departmental autonomy and willingness within depart-

ments to responsibly exercise this option.

Finally, we suggest the following configuration for the "option":

- Choice of language. The student, in consultation with his advisor, would select the language(s) appropriate to his field. Examinations could be obtained from the "Educational Testing Service" (Princeton). This would make the language examination a function of the student's needs, not a function of the university's limited testing facilities.

- Number of languages and degree of proficiency. The student, in consultation with his advisor, should decide how many languages will be incorporated in his graduate program and whether he should be qualified to read, read and converse, etc. in any or all of the languages.

- Substitutions. If a language is not appropriate to the student's academic pursuit, appropriate substitutions should be made. Such substitutions might include proficiency in: statistics, computer programming, research methodology, etc.

The authority to implement these innovations rests solely with the faculty. We sincerely hope that the faculty is sensitive to the consequences of wielding this authority in making decisions so seriously affecting our abilities to meet current and future needs of our common profession.

visory Council. At this meeting (announced in the new Graduate Student Newsletter), a much more "liberal" language requirement was adopted and will be recommended to the Faculty Senate. But no Emerald reporter was present.

It seems that an Emerald reporter did attend the first GSAC meeting, but left early (do all of your reporters leave early?) and no story of the meeting ever appeared in the Emerald.

On April 11 the Emerald missed another opportunity; it could have had a story on the E-UCMA concert that night of pianist Gina Bachauer. So as not to appear caught with your guard down, the Emerald did not report the performance in its next issue, either. The concert was not as well attended as would be expected for someone of Miss Bachauer's fame. (Please do tell us when the Cleveland Orchestra arrives.)

I believe that this is the second time this year that the Emerald failed to give advance notice of a E-UCMA concert, which the Student Union supports to the tune of 75 cents per student, or \$9,184.50 for the 1965-66 school year. For that kind of money I want the Emerald to tell me two or three times about an upcoming concert.

While your support of the changes in the language requirements is—perhaps—welcomed, your factual knowledge of the subject is shockingly inadequate. The tests do not consist of "150 lines of carefully selected prose." Having taken and pass-

ed two tests of not more than 50 lines each, I must contradict your "facts." The only thing "wrong with a newspaper printing facts" is that your newspaper prints errors and calls them facts.

Furthermore, you seem unclear about the present level of competence in the first language (you say, "fairly well" and "half-well" in the same paragraph!). Having also taken (at the University) and passed a speaking exam in the first language, I deny that this is an appropriate or even tougher requirement. One can forget how to speak a language, and few need to know how. For some people, however, it would be an appropriate alternative to the present system.

Earlier this year the graduate students of the political science department sent to Dean Tyler a proposal for changing the language requirements. We sent a copy to the Emerald. The Emerald did not print the text of the proposal, even after being requested to do so later. Once again you simply are not reporting the news.

Resign, Emerald editor; resign! May 1 is not soon enough.
