OTI Student Files for Oregon Resident Status

LA GRANDE, Ore. (AP)—The son of a prominent former Oregon political figure appealed to the State Board of Higher Education Tuesday for classification as a resident student.

Stephen Hitchcock, 23, finishing his second year at Oregon Technical Institute, Klamath Falls, appeared before the board for 45 minutes.

The board, winding up a two-day meeting, deferred action because only five of its nine members were present.

Hitchcock is the son of former State Sen. Phillip S. Hitchcock, R-Klamath Falls. The father ran for the U.S. Senate in 1956, losing in the primary to Douglas McKay, who dramatically entered the race against him at the last minute.

The elder Hitchcock now lives in New York and is executive officer of the national organization of laymen of the United Presbyterian Church.

To be classified as a resident student would save young Hitchcock \$360 a year. If the board rules in his favor, the result could be that many non-resident students would be classified as residents.

Stephen Hitchcock lived in Bend and Klamath Falls until 1958, when his family moved to White Swan, Wash., where they have an interest in a lumber mill.

He was graduated from White Swan High School in 1961. He spent the next three years working in the mill and going to Yakima Junior College for a year.

He said he entered OTI in 1964 because the State of Washington does not have a school to give him the mill machinery courses he is getting at OTI.

He based his claim for Oregon residence on the fact that he is a registered voter in Oregon, pays Oregon income taxes, and intends to work for the Gerlinger Carrier Co. in Dallas, Ore., when he finishes school in June.

Phillip A. Joss, Portland, a board member, illustrated the board's problem by saying:

"The whole business of domicile is one of the most elusive things in the law."

Hitchcock's case was heard a week ago by the Inter-Institutional Residence Classification Committee, made up of officials of various state universities and colleges. It upheld the OTI ruling that he is a non-resident.

Hitchcock's attorney is State Rep. John Dellenback, (R-Medford) a candidate for Congress.

Such appeals to the board are rare. The last one was in December, 1964.

Photo-Biology 'Browsing' Topic

"Exploring the Mechanisms of Life with a Microscope and a Movie Camera" is the title of the Browsing Room Program today at 7:30 p.m. in the Student Union, not Tuesday, as was erroneously announced in Tuesday's Emerald.

The program will feature the first showing of a film which shows internal structures in action in some of the transparent invertebrates that inhabit ponds around Eugene.

The circulation of the blood in the blood sinuses, the beating heart, the valves of the heart in action during the beating, the nerve cord and its connection with sensory structure, are some of the things that will be shown in the film.

The lecturer will be James Kezer, associate professor of biology, assisted by Harrison Howard, consultant in microscope and photograph for the University's biology department.

Kezer has focused much of his research on evolution in salamanders. He has attempted for several years to relate chromosome number and morphology to the mechanism of evolution in the various salamander groups.

The biologist has made two trips to Europe in recent years to work on this project.

Discussion leader for the evening will be Walter Youngquist, professor of geology.
