About 150 judges, district attorneys, sheriffs, and chiefs of police will meet in Eugene today, Friday, and Saturday, to consider Oregon's controversial new implied consent law and other topics.

Enforcement of the new law involving persons charged with driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor (DUIL) will be the focus of the conference, as well as highways in Oregon and proposed traffic safety legislation.

The 14th annual Oregon Traffic Court Conference is sponsored by the University Law School, the Traffic Court Rules Committee, and the Division of Continuing Education.
