penses were raised \$50, Goldschmidt looking forward to next year's legislative activity.

Inter-school activities were allotted \$1,585, entirely for membership in the National Student Association). ASUO spent \$1,029.54 on NSA this year. Another program, designed specifically for collegiate leaders and used by ASUO during the 1965-66 year, was dropped from the inter-school budget.

A separate budget was set up for conferences, Goldschmidt expressing hope that next year's administration would attempt to hold a convocation similar to that devoted to national poverty problems last winter term. Cost for that conference was \$2,000. Goldschmidt told the senate that matching funds could probably be obtained from private foundations for financing such conferences once the ASUO put up the money.

The complete budget will be submitted to the Budget Board at its meeting Monday night. Goldschmidt was confident of the budget's passage, because, he said, "the ASUO has never asked for any increases" during the past several years.
