

YR's Schedule Candidates' Fair

University Young Republicans scheduled a Candidates' Fair, approved a representative to the Student Political Union, planned a party, and heard Fred Van Natta discuss local election campaigns Thursday night.

The Candidates' Fair will be held at 7 p.m. next Thursday. All candidates for the ASUO final election will be invited to speak. The club will make endorsements which will be mailed to all members with the recommendation that they vote for the approved candidates.

Tom Mesher, a junior in political science, introduced a motion recognizing the SPU and approving an official YR representative to that group. He explained that it will function as a lobby for the interests of all campus political groups with regard to University policies.

When the motion was approved Mesher was appointed to officially represent the YR club while the SPU is being organized.

Van Natta, executive director of the Lane County Republican Central Committee, urged club

members to work for local candidates. "Working at the local level is a good way to personally meet those involved. This is the way you break into the business."

According to Van Natta, there are four points to consider when discussing an election: candidates, issues, organization, and money.

"Money is the easiest to discuss for Republicans — we don't have very much," he quipped. Then he went on to discuss GOP achievements during the last legislative session, stressing the party's emphasis on education in the state.

"What elects candidates is work," said Van Natta as he explained the volunteer jobs which are needed in the county. Students may work in the party headquarters or for an individual candidate.

Van Natta applauded the "strong" statewide ticket of Hatfield and McCall and the "well-balanced" county ticket which includes a farmer, a business man, an attorney, and an educator.

French Lecturer Here to Speak

Gabriel Marcel, French philosopher, will be a guest lecturer at the University today.

Marcel will speak at 8 p.m. in the Student Union. His lecture, "The Sacred in the Technical Age," will be in English.

The philosopher represents Christian existentialism in France. He has been a militant Catholic over more than three decades. It was he who introduced the work of Kierkegaard to the French, in about 1925.

In France, Marcel is known for his theatrical works as well as his writings in philosophy.

Group to Give Dance Concert

The University Repertory Dancers, a group which has given over 40 concerts throughout the Northwest during the four years since its origin, will present a dance concert at 8 p.m. tonight and Saturday at the University Theatre.

The Repertory Dancers is the only performing group of its kind on the West Coast and one of only a few in the United States.

Dance directors are M. Frances Dougherty, national leader in dance education, and K. Wright Dunkley, professional dancer, choreographer and educator. Miss Dougherty is a professor, and Dunkley an assistant professor of physical education.

Bruno Madrid, a staff member of the dance division of the University's School of Health, Physical Education and recreation, is musical director.

The concerts will include dances ranging from traditional to avant-garde. Choreography by the directors and students will be featured as well as dances by the choreographer of "My Fair Lady" and a professional dancer.
