

Budget OK'd ...

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question. Moore withdrew his motion, and the Senate approved the motion, which will also go before the Budget Board today.

The Senate also reviewed and approved a new, much-increased budget for the International Education Center. The budget, presented by director Mark Fritzler, is a proposed \$755 for next year, an increase of \$435 over this year.

IEC Budget

The big jumps in the budget were a new \$590 salary for a managing director, a new \$262 salary for an executive secretary to the directors, \$100 for international student programming, \$200 for transportation services (for administration and advertising of the Center's yearly charter flights to Europe, formerly taken out of other Center funds), and \$100 for research and development, which will pay for background work on future budgets and a new IEC Director now. The sum of \$110 was added to provide for the distribution of a new "bulletin" next year, similar to the World Affairs bulletins now published every noon.

The senators voted unanimously to place the proposed amendments to the ASUO Constitution on the May 11 general election ballot. The amendments, already adopted as Senate by-laws, state that:

Concurrent Offices

- No member of the ASUO shall concurrently hold, or be a candidate for, more than one elected office or position included in the ASUO budget;

- The international student representative should be chosen from the international students;

- Freshman men's and women's dorm representatives shall be elected fall term and hold

office until the end of the following spring term;

- Ex post facto laws pertaining to the Constitution are invalid;

- And that the vacancy of any office elected under the Constitution shall be filled during the next election, except for student body president and class presidents.

Research Committee

In other business, the Senate heard, and unanimously approved, a bill proposed by senator-at-large Chuck Stout recommending that "a research committee be established to ... coordinate existing community volunteer programs ... with the new School (of Public Affairs), to innovate new programs as their needs are realized, and to channel and increase resources for such programs."

Stout's bill recommends the integration of such University community projects as Migrant Labor and the Community Volunteer Organization with similar organizations in Eugene and Lane County, and that students get academic credit for work therein.

Stout pointed out that it was possible for the school to get private grants for such programs, and that several eastern schools ran their programs almost entirely with grants.

Finally, following the reading of a request from SU Board chairman Dick Lawrence, the Senate nominated five senators for at-large positions on the SU Board: Jim Beat, Bob Colman, and Hal Kingslien for one-year terms; and John Taylor for a two-year term. The Board will interview the candidates Wednesday and make their recommendation to President Flemming.

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dent responsibility in the running of the University," he said, "and they're talking about splitting the campus up into two parties without issues. That's part of the game of student government and student government is no longer a game."

He also questioned leaving out the off-campus students, who make up close to 60 per cent of the student body.

"Political parties would be fine if they were based on issues," he summed up.

He also took a jibe at another of Hansell's proposals, to have Student Court try the Emerald in cases of libel.

In Civil Court

"If there is a reporter from the Emerald here," Drummonds said, "I want to tell you that if you say something libelous about me I'm going to take you to civil court and sue you, not to Student Court."

Drummonds said it is important that students "realize that our community is not alone. We are citizens of society and student government should encourage dialogue among students on the great social and political is-

sues of the day."

He said Senate stands on national and international issues is one way of doing that, "but it is not essential to creating such a dialogue."

Viet Nam Position

One person in the audience asked Drummonds what his position on Viet Nam is.

"I think the Johnson administration policy is totally bankrupt," he said, "but I do not think that the United States can withdraw summarily from Viet Nam. I think the emphasis on the military aspect of the war is too great and that the real conflict, the social and economic problem, has been ignored."

Drummonds got a heavy round of applause for that statement.

He also reiterated his challenge to Hansell (who had not yet left the race) and the other presidential candidate, John Ressler, to debate him at the Free Speech Platform.

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of our opponents to withdraw from the race at this late stage. We have strived and shall continue to strive to make this a campaign of issues."

Ressler was out of town and unavailable for comment Sunday.

Hansell's statement also said:

"... let me emphasize that I am not resigning because it looks like a hard fight. No man need be afraid of a fight if he sincerely believes he is right and is prepared to give his all in achieving the goals to which he aspires."

"Nor am I admitting in any way that the platform I am running on is invalid. I believe, very sincerely, in Emerald reform, political parties, student committee on higher education, and the other planks in the platform."

"I want to give my warmest and sincerest thanks to all those wonderful students that have helped me in my campaign," Hansell added. "Many of them have put in much time and labor and I would hope that they would continue to support Mike as a candidate for student body president or as a candidate for the Senate."

Hansell's statement said Donahue would run for the Senate on the same platform as the two had run for the top offices.

Hansell said that regardless of which office Donahue runs for, "I wholeheartedly endorse him."

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
