

More Campus Facilities For Recreation Planned

Several on-campus recreational facilities were approved by President Arthur S. Flemming and should be ready by fall term, reported Jack Cross, acting director of the Student Union, to the SU Board in its meeting Wednesday.

Lighting for the Alder Street tennis courts will be done immediately. The rest of the program calls for the following:

- Six temporary tennis courts in the area near the Bean complex on the east side of campus. The tennis courts will be of asphalt and will be planned to last four years. At that time a new

dormitory will be built on the site.

- Two play fields in the Mill-race area, east of the physical plant.

- Extension of hours for recreational swimming in Leighton Pool, from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

- An equipment pool enabling students to check out equipment free for almost all sports. The pool will be located in the men's locker room, but the locker room will have to be slightly remodeled to allow girls to check out equipment, too.

- A one-hour extension of the

time the men's gymnasium will be open.

President Flemming declined to commit the Hayward Field area, said Cross, until a special investigation can be made.

Flemming's action was prompted by a letter SU Board Chairman Dick Lawrence wrote to Flemming reporting the Board's recommendation on the results of the student survey Cross made recently.

In other action the Board heard a report from Recreation Council Chairman Bruce Mason that there will be a mixed doubles tennis tournament Saturday, May 14.

Graduate Grants Now Available

Competition for the 1967-68 United States government graduate grant for academic study or research abroad, and for professional training in the creative and performing arts, is officially open, the Institute of International Education announced recently.

Travel grants will be available to France, Germany, Israel, Italy, the Netherlands, Sweden, and Turkey. Excepting Israel, these and 45 other countries will be participating in the full grant program.

The grants are available through the Institute under the Fulbright-Hays Act.

Candidates who wish to apply for a grant must be U.S. citizens, have a bachelor's degree or equivalent by the beginning date of the grant, and in most instances, be proficient in the language of the host country.

Applicants should have a good academic record and be well informed on the American political and social scene.

The grants are provided especially for graduating seniors and graduate students up to and including the M.A. level who are interested in a year of course work in a university in the American republics area.

These grants are not intended to support doctoral dissertations projects.

Preference is given to single applicants under 35, although married couples may apply. The awards make no provision for travel expenses or support of dependents.

Selections will be made on the basis of the applicant's academic or professional record — or both.

Applicant forms and further information for students enrolled at the University may be obtained from the campus Fulbright advisor, Kenneth S. Ghent, professor of mathematics.

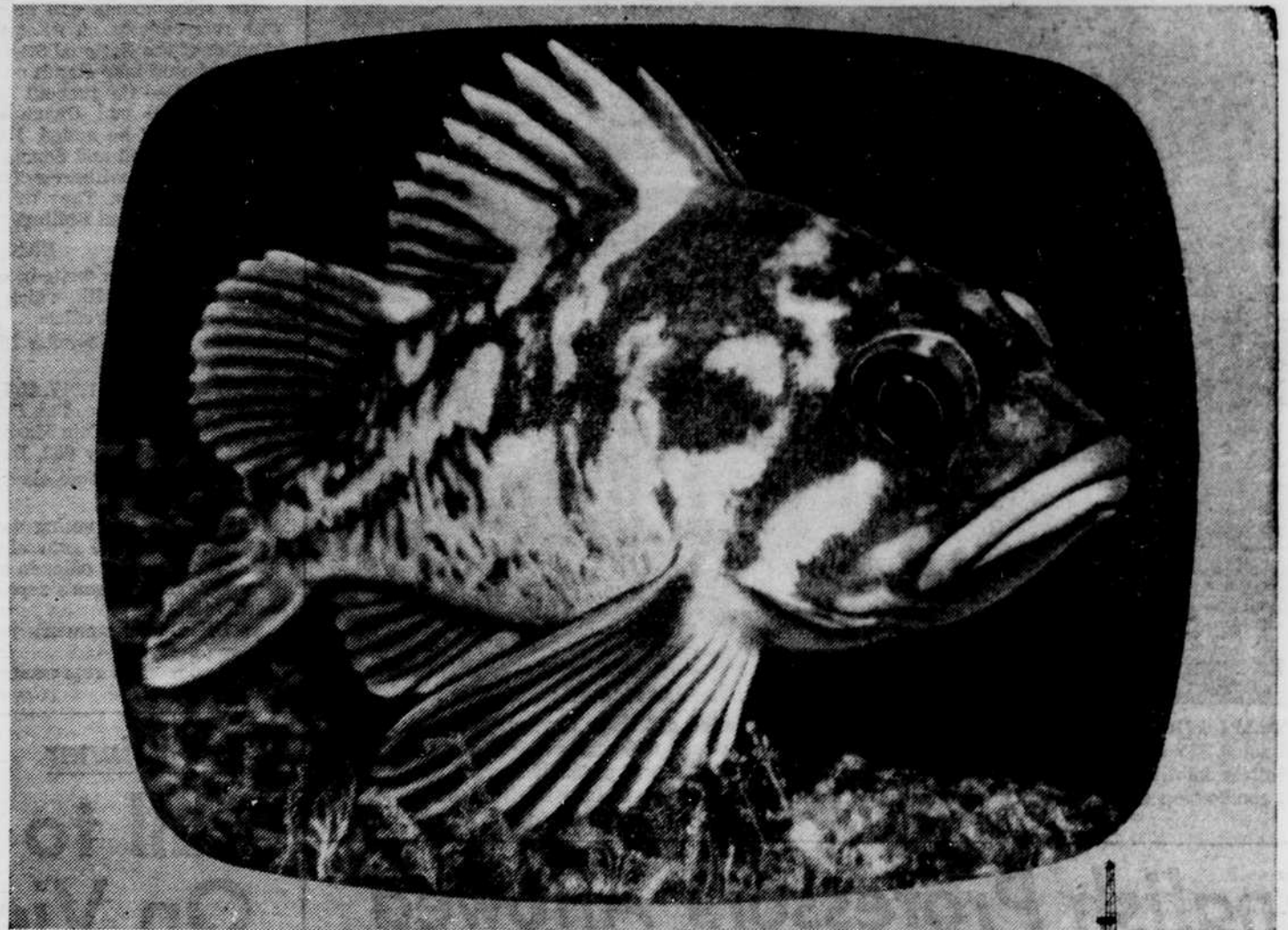
Forty Job Corpsmen Tested for Diplomas

TONGUE POINT (Special) — Forty Tongue Point Job Corpsmen have successfully completed the GED (General Education Development) test administered by Clatsop Community College officials, giving them the equivalent of a high school diploma, and enabling them to be eligible for college study.

The test—which takes two and one-half days to complete—consists of sections on social studies, science, literary interpretation, math, grammar, and writing skills.

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
