

University to Sponsor Historical Field Trips

The public may participate in tours to historical sites in Oregon and in a botanical field trip sponsored by the University Office of Continuing Education during May.

Mrs. Victor P. Morris, well-known lecturer in Oregon history, will accompany the historical tours, and point out other sites of historical interest as well as information about the specific locations which will be visited.

The first chartered bus tour, May 11, will include a visit to the boyhood home of Herbert Hoover—the present Minthorn House in Newberg—and to the Portland mansion of Henry Pittock, publisher of the Oregonian Publishing Company for many years.

A personal friend of former President Hoover, Burt Brown Barker, will conduct the tour of the Minthorn House. Barker, vice president emeritus of the University, was responsible for the restoration of this historical landmark.

The famous residence of John McLoughlin, head of the Hudson's Bay Company in the early days of Oregon history, will be toured during the May 14 tour. That tour group will also visit Champoege State Park and the adjacent residence of Robert Newell, Oregon pioneer and fur trapper who was prominent in the state's provisional government.

James Hickman, graduate assistant in biology at the University will conduct a field trip on May 21 to explore some of the trees, shrubs, and plants in the Cascades.

All interested persons are eligible to participate, although the number of participants in each tour will be limited. A registration fee of \$7 covers bus fare, and admission charges to the McLoughlin House and the Newell House.

Construction Planned For Oregon Libraries

An inventory of academic library buildings or additions in Oregon which have been completed since January 1, 1960, or which are now under construction shows nine projects with a total cost of \$7,480,168.

Results of the inventory were released by the State Sponsoring Committee for National Library Week, scheduled April 17 to 23.

Projects listed included: Central Oregon College, Bend, \$256,000; George Fox College, Newberg, \$266,415; Linfield College, McMinnville, \$300,000; Multnomah School of the Bible, Portland, \$11,300; Oregon State University, Corvallis, \$2,215,553; Oregon Technical Institute, Klamath Falls, \$150,000; Reed College, Portland, \$580,000; Southern Oregon College, Ashland, \$1,600,000; and the University, \$2,100,000.

In addition, the inventory showed 20 Oregon academic library building projects which are in the planning stages. Institutions involved were:

Blue Mountain Community College, Pendleton, \$709,000 (estimated cost); Cascade College, Portland, \$600,000; Clatsop College, Astoria, \$400,000; Concordia College, Portland, \$600,000; Eastern Oregon College, La Grande,

\$334,000; Lane Community College, Eugene, \$1,500,000; Lewis and Clark College, Portland, \$1,353,000.

Marylhurst College, Marylhurst, \$973,000; Mt. Angel Abbey, St. Benedict, \$800,000; Mt. Angel College, Mt. Angel, \$850,000; Oregon College of Education, Monmouth, \$530,000; Oregon State University, Corvallis, \$1,104,820; Pacific University, Forest Grove, \$710,000; Portland Community College, Portland, \$297,000; Portland State College, Portland, \$1,938,500.

Southwestern Oregon Community College, Coos Bay, \$335,400; Treasure Valley Community College, Ontario; Umpqua Community College, Roseburg, \$303,000; the University (Science Division), and the University Medical School, Portland, \$267,000.

Stahl Receives Honorary Role

Franklin W. Stahl, professor of biology at the University, has gone to Oakland University at Rochester, Mich., to receive the honorary degree of doctor of science at Oakland University's fourth commencement program. He is an associate in the University Institute of Molecular Biology.

Stahl and Meselson collaborated on experiments that established the way in which DNA, the hereditary material, duplicates. Stahl has since then made basic contributions towards understanding the mechanism by which certain mutations occur and also towards understanding recombination. He is the author of a textbook on genetics.
