

Peace Corps Needs Project Volunteers

Chuck Butler, Peace Corps recruiter on campus Monday, said that staff members will be trying to sign up 500 volunteers to train this summer for work in Micronesia.

Micronesia, the United States-administered United Nations Trust Territory in the Western Pacific, is going to have a plebiscite in the near future to determine what kind of government the citizens want.

Butler said that this is a good opportunity for the Peace Corps workers to show both America and the rest of the world just how long it takes a developing

country to develop. He added that due to political pressure, the United States has helped many countries gain independence but these countries had no tools to help them govern themselves.

The Micronesian legislature has asked for Peace Corps volunteers in the field of education, community development, health, public works, public administration, communication and agriculture.

Butler emphasized that these jobs can be filled by anyone with a liberal arts degree and their degree of motivation.

Because of the urgency of Micronesia's needs, the Peace Corps has created a new, simplified application procedure. It includes a special shortened application form which concentrates on skills needed specifically for this territory. No placement test will be required and all applicants will be notified of acceptance or refusal by telephone within 15 days.

Lecturer to Talk On Archaeology

His lecture is entitled "The Search for Stratified Archaeic Sites in the Carolina Piedmont."

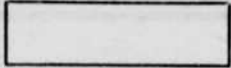
Coe's main field of interest has been in the archaeology of south-eastern United States, with emphasis on research in his own state of North Carolina, and archaeological research in Illinois.

He is currently engaged in an extensive program of research on Cherokee archaeology.

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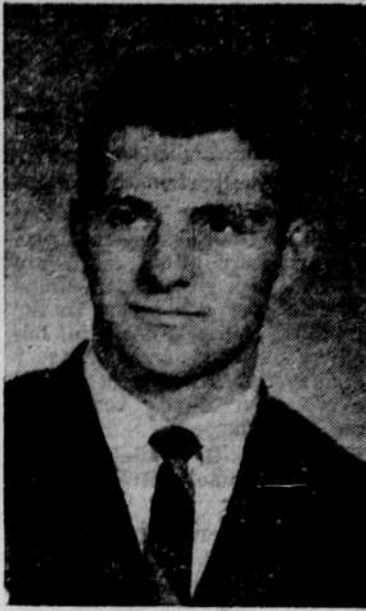
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
