

Senate Stand Opposes Johnson Policy ...

 ments countered, "You mean like SPECTRE?" referring to James Bond.

Several senators objected to including the "essay" in the bill, and felt just stating the four main proposals of action was sufficient.

Taylor said the strength of the bill lies in the essay which explains the stand which the Senate has taken, and added "any nit-wit can come up with these four points."

A motion made by Skip Clemens, senator-at-large, to table the

bill until after today's election was defeated.

John Moore, senator-at-large, moved to delete the paragraph asking U.S. troops to stay in Viet Nam until after the elections are held.

He said U.S. troops should be withdrawn as soon as possible and the U.S. should not wait to withdraw until the "newly elected government so requests."

Pruitt said the bill should advocate "something reasonable which can be followed, and that the presence of U.S. troops would

guarantee more fully a free election."

In other business, the Senate passed a bill, 18-0, with two abstentions, urging the faculty to adopt the pass-nonpass system of PE grading for non-majors, and suggested a "shadow-grading" system.

A bill authorizing Theta Chi to conduct an all-campus fund drive to raise money to help pay broad jumper Bob Woodell's, who was injured working on Canoe Fete, hospital expenses was passed unanimously.

Another bill recommending 13th St. between University and Kincaid Sts. be closed to traffic was passed 15-3.

Ron Greenman, author of the bill, asked that the bill be considered as a "show of student in-

terest in the proposal rather than recommending any definite alternative route for traffic."

A bill recommending that one side of the Hayward Field bleachers be torn down and that area used for recreational space was defeated 10-9.

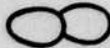
