

Dean Proclaims

Business Day To Cancel Class

Richard W. Lindholm, dean of the School of Business Administration, has proclaimed Thursday as Business Administration Day.

He also declared a "moratorium" on the afternoon and evening classes Thursday of the School of Business Administration and said any midterms the following day are "definitely discouraged."

In view of this, he urges every student in the B.A. school to participate in the day's activities.

Tickets for the day are on sale at the Student Union, at the table in front of Lindholm's office in Commonwealth, and in the Alpha Kappa Psi office in room 239 Commonwealth. The prices are \$3.25 for students, \$6 for a student couple, \$4.25 for a faculty member, and \$8 for a faculty couple.

Activities will begin with the annual golf tournament at the Oakway Golf Club. Awards will be given for the high and low scores. All those wishing to participate in the tournament should

sign up on the bulletin board in front of Lindholm's office.

A softball game will be held at 2 p.m. at University park, 24th and University St. Participants will include graduates and undergraduates, as well as faculty members. Those interested in playing may contact Mrs. Leonard at Lindholm's office.

The highlight of B. A. Day activities is the banquet Thursday evening at the Eugene hotel. The social hour will begin at 6 p.m. in the Empire Room. The banquet will follow at 7:30 p.m. in the King Cole room.

"Demonstration for Business" is the theme of this year's program. Leslie Anderson, associate professor of finance, will be master of ceremonies. Awards will be presented at the banquet. A new award will be inaugurated this year for the best teacher of 1961, as judged by the graduating class of 1961.

Don Kennedy, director of sales for White Stag Manufacturing Co., will be the guest speaker.

Open Meetings, P.E. Grades Top Agenda for Faculty

The University faculty has six items on the agenda for its next two meetings, scheduled for today and May 18. Two of them concern educational reform, three concern the press and the public, and one is administrative.

● Advisory council balloting is the first item. This council acts as a liaison between the faculty and the administration.

● Next is a motion to open faculty meetings to the general public for a trial period of three years. This proposal originated in the Faculty Senate.

● Another motion would place certain physical education courses on a no-grade basis for non-majors. The Student-Faculty Council has recommended that this proposal be approved.

● The fourth motion is to allow an appropriate substitute for one of the two foreign languages of which a reading knowledge is now required for the Ph.D. degree. The Graduate Student Advisory Council and the ASUO Curriculum Committee were both

working with this proposal when a faculty member introduced it.

● Maintaining the right of anonymity of faculty members participating in the discussion of issues raised at faculty meetings is the fifth motion. This was introduced by Gregory Wannier,

professor of physics.

● The last motion would make the preliminary version of the complete minutes of each faculty meeting available to the press.

Motions not acted on today will be considered next week.

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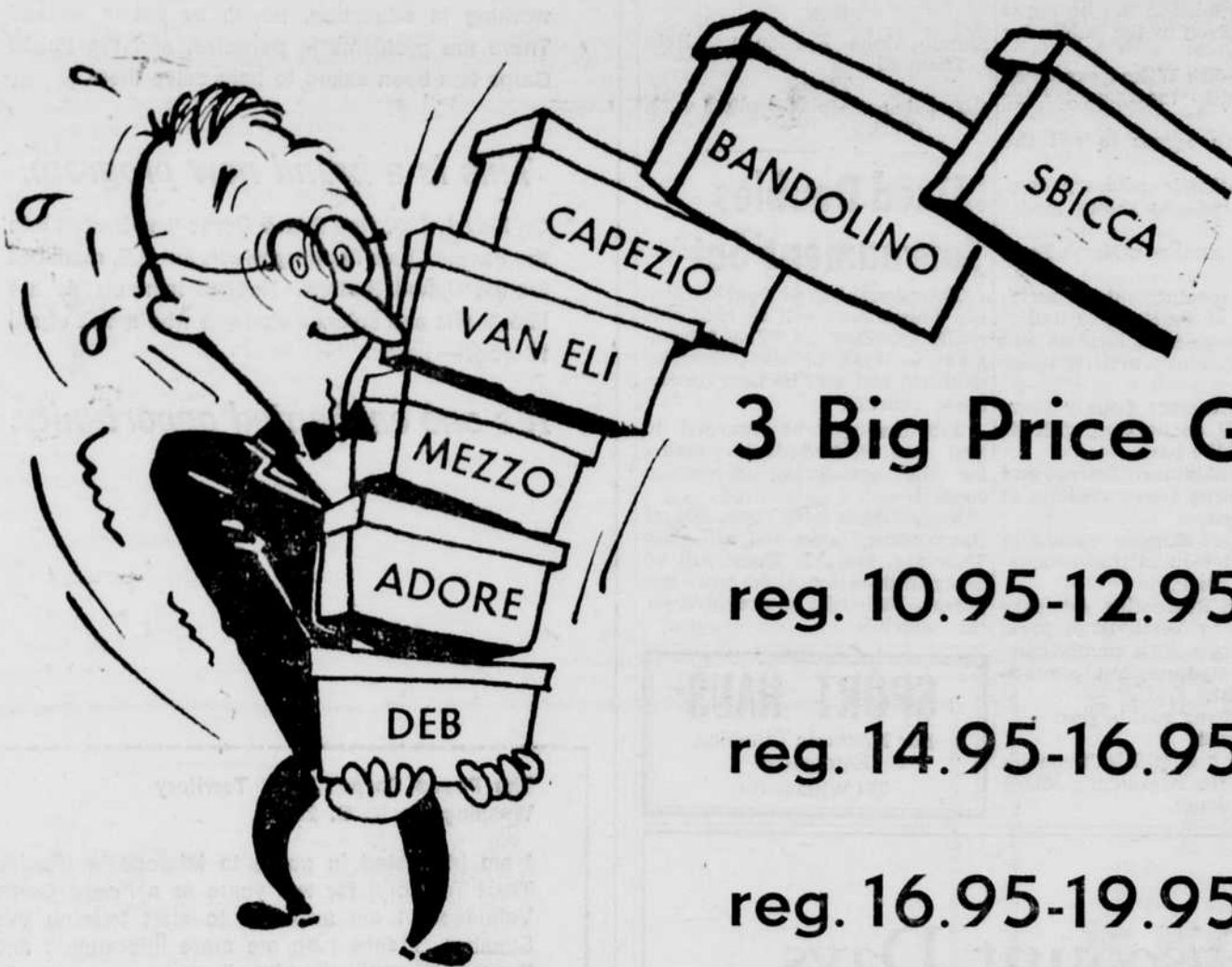
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
