

Board Renames 'Next' Editors

The Student Publications Board Monday selected three editors for Next magazine and approved an activities handbook.

The three editors are William Lovell, Roberta Nudo, and Christopher Dyer. Lovell and Miss Nudo were editors of the publication this year.

The group of editors will elect from among themselves a chair-

man, a position Lovell held this year.

The Board passed two motions concerning the activities handbook:

● One motion approved the idea of the publication but left undecided the decision under what budget and from what source the funds would come.

● The second motion states that the Publications Board thought the funds should come from sources and above the budget requests previously made for publications.

The activities handbook will include a listing of all student groups on campus, their officers, and the way to become involved in such activities.

Unless students respond to the invitation to contact their advisors immediately and unless they do so in very large numbers, we will probably see a repetition next fall on an even grander scale of the situation about which students complained so bitterly last fall during and immediately after registration week. In that unhappy event, I hope that many students will remember that the faculty and administration made a serious effort to prevent it.
