

Alternatives Eyed To Draft Policy

NEW YORK (UPI) — Tomorrow's draftee will be able to choose the Peace Corps instead of the Army if an informal organization of East Coast educators, government representatives and foundation officials have its way.

Spokesman Donald Eberly of Old Greenwich, Conn., said Sunday that the group will urge government revision of the draft law to permit young men to choose a variety of forms of socially useful work as an alternative in military service.

Eberly said the present draft law expires next year. Eberly is executive associate of the Overseas, Educational Service, which recruits teachers for universities

in underdeveloped nations.

He said the 31 persons at the meeting agreed each man has the duty to fulfill a service obligation to the United States. But he should have the option of fulfilling the obligation in a non-military activity, Eberly said, such as the Peace Corps, the war on poverty or federal conservation projects.

The delegates also recommended an end to draft deferments for students in order that all men will serve a period of national service.

Eberly said the option of working in nonmilitary activities could provide an alternative for persons with moral or other objections to military service and could provide the federal government with a manpower pool for its growing number of social programs.

He stressed, however, that personnel requirements for national defense would necessarily take priority under such a draft law.

The group plans to publish its recommendations in a booklet within two months, Eberly said.

Honors College To Hear Lecturer

Jacob Bronowski will lecture on "Science and the Imagination" today at 7:30 p.m. in 123 Science. The lecture, which is sponsored by the Honors College, is open to the public.

Bronowski was born in Poland and was a resident of England from 1920 until recently. He has been a senior lecturer at University College at Hall (1934-42) and was a visiting professor at MIT in 1953. He served as a member of the Chief of Staff's mission to Japan in 1945, was an official in the Ministry of Works from 1946 to 1950 and was Director of the National Coal Board from 1950 to 1959. At present he is a fellow of the Salk Institute in San Diego.

Bronowski is the author of Science and Human Values and The Common Sense of Science and co-author of The Western Intellectual Tradition.

General Allison's son, Michael William, is a freshman at the University and enrolled in the AFROTC program.

Fulbright Awards Grant Research

Three University faculty members have recently received Fulbright awards to teach, study, or do research abroad.

They are Thomas R. Hart, Jr., professor of romance languages; Lewis R. Goldberg, associate professor of psychology; and William Elwood, part-time instructor of speech.

Hart will do research in Madrid, Spain, with his Fulbright research award. He will be working on a book about the 16th century Portuguese playwright Gil Vicente while in Spain.

Goldberg will leave for Spain in August and remain there through the academic year.

Elwood, a doctoral candidate in theater who will receive his degree this summer, will be study-

ing at a German university next year under his Fulbright grant. As he plans to specialize in German theater eventually, Elwood will affiliate with a theater while in Germany to observe production practices.
