

Rights Assembly To Argue Issues

The full implications of the Watts crisis will head the topics of discussion at the Civil Rights Assembly at the University Friday.

Entitled "New Directions for Equal Opportunities," the conference will explore current concepts for the complete attainment of equal opportunity rights.

Speakers at the assembly, to be held in the Student Union, will be Henry Talbert, Arthur Reese, and Jack Rosenthal.

Talbert is the western regional director of the National Urban League in Los Angeles. He has been intimately involved in the "Watts" crises and will discuss community action programs for that area and in Harlem.

Reese, representing the American Federation of Teachers, is executive director of Freedom School Projects. Both he and Talbert will speak at 9 a.m. in the

Ballroom. The morning session will be followed by a question and answer period.

In the afternoon, beginning at 1 p.m., Jack Rosenthal will discuss the voting rights act and legislative proposals on housing and jury selection.

Rosenthal, a former Oregonian reporter, is now a special assistant to Attorney General Nicholas Katzenbach. He has recently been involved in implementing the 1965 voting rights act in some southern state.

He also just returned from observing the Alabama primary election. He will give some person anecdotes on the events of that southern election.

A. J. Franklin, co-ordinator for the conference said, "It is believed that the sharing of ideas will give some understanding of the needs in the Civil Rights area and will encourage involvement of the University community in action programs."

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described by the District Attorney as one of two "professional cynics and nay-sayers who want to believe that our government does not sincerely want peace in the world." The audience is left with the feeling that Mr. Porter is not patriotic.

There are some esteemed members of Congress who feel that current U.S. foreign aid policies and the "Immoral Neutrality" doctrine of John Foster Dulles have outlived their use, that their retention fosters Communism, that our efforts in Viet Nam have had the adverse effect of embittering many of the emerging nations, while making many more Viet Cong.

As the Viet Nam war spreads to Laos and Cambodia and possibly to China, do those who seriously question the effectiveness of U.S. policy—men like J. W. Fulbright, Wayne Morse, Robert F. Kennedy, Arthur Schlesinger, Mark Hatfield, and Charles Porter deserve to be called "professional cynics and nay-sayers?" It is irresponsible for any candidate, however ambitious, to obscure the issues with over-simplifications and ultra-patriotic slogans.

The Frye campaign strategy poses some serious questions. His defensive posture, attacking Mr. Porter with emotional invective instead of defending his own legislative record and capabilities or displaying a knowledge of foreign affairs, exposes the probable realization that Mr. Porter is running far ahead in the 4th District. The initial feeling that Mr. Frye's anonymity would be more appealing than Mr. Porter's supposed notoriety has seem to have yielded to the acceptance that in order to contest Mr. Porter's stronghold in Lane and Coos Counties, Mr. Frye would have to attack Mr. Porter in traditionally conservative Jackson County-Medford and Ashland.
