**440 Hurdles:** Williams UW, Buller UO, Cope UO, Dally WSU. Williams is all-everything, but only good enough to win one event.

**440 Relay:** UW, UO, WSU. Watch out for Washington State.

**Mile Relay:** WSU, OSU, UW, UO. The Ducks are hopelessly out-classed.

**Long Jump:** Albin OSU, Jackson OSU, Brame UO, Williams UW. Albin's the best, and Jackson beat Brame last week.

**Discus:** Steinhauer UO, Pemberton UW, Tollefson OSU, Hanson UW. Neal has beaten him before, and he'll do it again.

## 'Almost In' Cougars Face Ducks In Three Game Series

The magic number for the Oregon baseball team is 12.

Any combination of six Washington State losses and six Oregon wins will bring the Webfoots their second Northern Division baseball title in three years.

Only trouble is, there are exactly one dozen games for that combination of 12 to be met . . . which means that to win the N.D. title the Webfoots must win their remaining six games while the Cougars must lose all of theirs.

And the Cougars, fourth-ranked nationally and boasting a full five-game lead over second-place Oregon in the Northern Division race, invade Howe Field this weekend for a three-game series with the Ducks.

Oregon coach Don Kirsch realizes that WSU is in the N.D. driver's seat, but will give nothing away for this series.

"We're going to be fighting them all the way," he said.

Kirsch is expected to go with the three pitchers that have been doing most of the toiling for the Ducks so far this season, Jerry Gjesvold (3-2, 2.25), Ken Hadden (3-3, 3.51) and Mike Nicksic (3-2, 3.24).

Gjesvold has been especially

effective lately, pitching 12 1/3 innings of fine relief against Washington last weekend.

As of now, the weekend series seems to be a hitters versus pitchers battle.

The hurler-rich Cougars, with a trio of pitchers rated high on the Northern Division pitching statistics, will attempt to quiet the bats of the hard-hitting Ducks.

Going into the weekend's action, the Webfoots are performing at a .285 clip as a team at the plate. A brace of Ducks, short-stop Ron Delplanche and outfielder Dennis Baldrige, are currently leading the Northern Division in batting with .395 and .385 averages respectively.

Baldrige continues to lead the team in hitting with a .396 average. Delplanche is second at .355 and is closely followed by catcher Dale Ehler at .337.

Friday's game is billed to start at 3 p.m., while the Saturday doubleheader will start at 1:30 p.m.

Only two home games remain after the WSU series. Oregon State is scheduled for doubleheader action on Howe Field Saturday, May 21.

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# Berry, Renfro, Lead Alumni In 2nd Straight Win Quest



## Cas Leads Varsity Against Strong Alumni

The 1966 edition of the varsity football team will take on an alumni all-star squad led by former Oregon greats Bob Berry and Mel Renfro in the seventh annual alumni-varsity contest Saturday at 2 p.m. on Hayward Field. It will be the first big test for

next year's varsity after completion of the month-long spring training session.

Commenting on the varsity's chances for victory, head football coach Len Casanova said "We're always out to win," but added, "You never know about these games."

The varsity has a 4-2 edge in the series, but lost last year, 6-3, to an alumni team led by the same Bob Berry who will quarterback this year's team.

Joining Berry on the alumni team, coached by Jack Crabtree, quarterback for the 1957 Duck Rose Bowl team, will be two other members of Oregon's 1963 "Firehouse Four" backfield, Renfro and Larry Hill.

Berry holds the Duck career records for passing and total offense, while Renfro has the highest career kickoff return average, the fourth-best career mark for total yards gained rushing, and holds the Duck season scoring record.

Other Oregon "greats" returning for the game include Dave Wilcox, now a linebacker on the San Francisco Forty-Niners, Ray Palm, the second leading Oregon career receiver, and eleven other members of last year's varsity.

Casanova hopes to counter the potent alum attack with an of-

fense which includes Mike Brundage at quarterback, Jim Smith and Steve Jones at the halfback slots, and junior college transfer Jim Evenson at fullback.

Split end Lachlan Heron and tight end Steve Reina will be the chief targets for Brundage, who led the Ducks in passing last season.

Other members of the starting offensive line include Dan Archer and Ross Carter at tackles, Roger Stahlhut and Warner Wong at guards and Bill Smith at center.

The starting defensive backfield for the Ducks, comprised of "monster back" Jerry Richards, safety Tim Temple and halfbacks Ken Klein and Les Palm, should have its hand full trying to stop Berry's passes to flanker Renfro, split end Palm and tight end Rich Schwab.

"The alumni passing will hurt our boys," said Casanova. "Ordinarily the best thing in a game like this is passing." He hopes that the rigorous spring practice may enable the varsity gridders to "out-condition" the alumni.

Casanova said that the game will help the team since competing against different players is more of a challenge, especially such professional players as Berry, Renfro, and Wilcox.

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
