

Grad Tuition May Go Up...

ment of this major 'smokeless industry,' Lieuallen said.

• The increased need for teachers, both in the public schools and in colleges, indicates a need for increased graduate work in Oregon.

"Financial Argument"

"The major argument for increasing out-of-state tuition is a financial one—it will give us more money," Lieuallen summed up, "but I'm inclined to think that the arguments on the other side outweigh this economic argument."

Forrester suggested that choice of a program probably was more important to a graduate student than the fee.

But University President Arthur S. Flemming said the distance of the Oregon schools from most other major institutions made tuition a factor.

"When a student from the Midwest has several schools close

to home that he can attend, lower tuition becomes a factor in getting him to come out to Oregon," Flemming said.

Alone in West

Lieuallen said the Oregon schools are the only ones in the West that do not have a higher rate for non-resident graduate students. "However," he said, "that doesn't mean what we're doing is wrong."

Forrester asked about the University of Washington, which has the same distance problem Flemming discussed but also has a bigger graduate program than any of the Oregon schools.

"They've been at it over a longer period of time," Flemming noted.

Lieuallen said he expected the subject of out-of-state graduate student tuition might arouse "some legislative interest."

He added that if the State Board decided to raise the fee, it is customary at most schools to have it be less than the out-of-state fee for undergraduates.

OTI Raise Suggested

In one other tuition matter the Board members present — Forrester, Mrs. Johnson and Finance Committee Chairman John Snider

—agreed that out-of-state tuition at Oregon Technical Institute should be raised.

OTI presently has 124 out-of-state students who pay \$690 tuition compared to \$900 at the University, Oregon State, and Portland State.

Lieuallen's office will prepare a recommendation for the July meeting of the full Board on whether to make the change in one step or two. The Board will also have to decide whether there should be any change at all.

OTI Director Winston Purvine said that if a change were made he would recommend two steps. He said he did not favor a change.
