

2,000 Students Take Test

Some 400,000 college and high school students took examinations Saturday to help determine their draft status.

Approximately 2,000 students took the test at the University. Reaction to the three-hour test was relatively mild here. Comments ranged from "not bad" to "kind of interesting."

On the University of Pennsylvania campus, student reactions were somewhat the same. One student said, "It was much easier than the college boards," while another commented, "It was an insult to your intelligence."

However, not all reactions to the test were calm. At the University demonstrators passed out literature at the testing place. Approximately 20 members of the Student Faculty Committee to Stop the War in Viet Nam and Students for a Democratic Society set up several signs reading "Be a man, Learn to Kill," and "Viet Nam Exam—Do you know enough to Kill?" Testing officials did not interfere with the demonstrators.

Elsewhere, the reactions by students were more violent. On the University of Chicago campus, about 350 students seized control of the administration building from Wednesday until Friday night protesting the school's policy of supplying student grades and class standing to draft boards.

Friday night students left the building and went to President George Beadle's home only to find him not there. They left a

declaration outlining their stand and a token 25 demonstrators at the President's home and then withdrew.

In Washington, D.C., five youths who identified themselves as members of Students for a Democratic Society passed out literature. At the Ohio Wesleyan University test center one man threw eggs at demonstrators.

Students were not the only ones protesting the examinations.

Adam Clayton Powell, chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee has protested that the tests will penalize poorly educated Negroes and other minority groups. Test officials, however, have stated that the tests are only used as guides to the boards.

Nearly half of the 1.8 million students who now hold draft deferments did not take the test. Exams will also be given May 20 and June 3.
