In a recent poll, four out of five Willamette students voted in favor of Minear, with whom they have little acquaintance, against Blake, whom they know extremely well. The University has suffered, and the students have deeply resented his arbitrary, arrogant, threatening, and foolish tactics.

Blake says his campaign fund of \$18,000 (against Minear's fund of \$4,000) is raised by "coffee given by ladies," with no out-of-state money—a very suspicious explanation to those knowledgeable in the ways of political financing.

From my observation, it would be better, "for your children's sake," to give them the plague, than to replace Minear with Blake.
