LSD Authority Speaks Today

A talk by Dr. Sidney Cohen, an authority on research with LSD, will be given at 3 p.m. today in the ballroom of the Student Union. A question and answer period will follow his talk.

LSD is the symbol for Lysergic Acid Diethylamide, an hallucinogenic drug which can be manufactured in the laboratory, and is odorless, tasteless, and colorless.

A small amount of the drug can have mental effects. The drug is used in psychiatric research, and has also become a major, worldwide problem in the illegal drug traffic.

For ten years Dr. Cohen has investigated many problems of LSD and other hallucinogens, and has contributed some of the basic information in the field. His talk Thursday will be entitled "LSD: Problems and Promise."

Garfield Lectures On Science Skills

Eugene Garfield, director of the institute for scientific information, will present a seminar-lecture at 4 p.m. today in 123 Science.

He will answer questions and demonstrate searching techniques using Science Citation Indexes, a publication available in the science division of the library, which is sponsoring his talk.
