Faculty members will also fill out a questionnaire which includes some basic factual questions about the course (estimate the number of pages of reading outside the text assigned this term), his evaluation of the class and students, and his opinion about the rating's value to students, himself, and the University administration.

proval from the State Board of Higher Education and the Legislature.

The Committee recommended Lutes and Amundson; Gordon, McGoodwin, and Hinchliff; and Campbell, Miller, and Michael to the president as architects for the proposed behavioral science complex, which will house the anthropology, psychology and sociology departments.

This complex, along with three other buildings, will be located in the south-west corner of the campus, near the Schools of Music and Education.

Construction cost for the complex is approximately \$2,690,000 and the building, which will include classrooms, offices and labs, will take up approximately 87,685 square feet.

The committee also discussed whether out-of-state architects should be employed on University building projects.

Lindstrom said the Committee seemed to be unsympathetic to the idea unless the architects were employed as consultants.

A subcommittee was appointed to study the problem and to make recommendations for long-range policies.

Buckner Couple To Show Works

Paul Buckner and Kay Buckner are showing their work in May at the 12th Avenue Gallery in Eugene.

Buckner, who teaches sculpture at the University, has studied with sculptors Everett Du Pen and George Tsutakawa. On a Fulbright grant he studied at the Slade school of the University of London and also traveled in Europe. He has done various commissions on the West Coast, two of these being in Eugene.

Kay Buckner has been showing since 1957 at Newport Harbor at the Woessner Gallery and Frye Museum in Seattle. She has twice won first prize in the Washington State Drawing competition.

Their sculpture, paintings and drawings can be seen through June 1, Tuesday through Saturday from 3-6 p.m. and Friday evenings from 7-9 p.m. The gallery is at 361 E. 12th Ave.

UO, Kaspari Win Net Titles

Juli Kaspari captured the singles title and led Oregon to a tie with Washington for the team title in the Pacific Northwest Collegiate Women's Tennis Tournament held Friday and Saturday at the University.

Miss Kaspari, who is ranked first in the Northwest's 18-and-under division, swept to the singles title without the loss of a set, beating Washington State's Sandy Jones, 6-3, 6-1, in the finals.

Oregon's Ann Bennet reached the semi-finals of the second singles division before losing to Washington's Dianne Rudell, eventual division champion.

In doubles play Oregon's Roberta Aikin and Rose Ryan recorded an upset over the highly touted team from the University of Montana but were defeated in a three set semi-final match by top seeded Washington.

Oregon gained the team title when Oregon State upset Washington for the doubles championship.

The tournament concluded the tennis season for Oregon's Women's team, who, in addition to capturing the team title, have compiled a 4-0 season record.

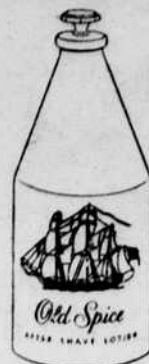
