

Invitational to Aid Injured Trackman

Tickets will go on sale today for the June 2 Bob Woodell Invitational Track Meet.

The proceeds from the meet, which will include an outstanding mile field, will be used to help defray the medical expenses incurred by Woodell, junior in business administration and University broad jumper and triple jumper, when he was critically injured May 1 in a freak accident. He was paralyzed from the waist down when a float being prepared for the Canoe Fete fell on him.

Woodell had almost no insurance coverage and about \$10,000 is needed to pay the necessary medical expenses.

The track meet and fund drive is sponsored by the ASUO and Theta Chi Fraternity, to which Woodell belongs.

Tickets to the exhibition meet, which will include six events, will cost \$1 per person. Even the participants will pay the admission fee.

Tickets will be on sale at the

Student Union main desk, and at a table on the SU Terrace. Also, a representative of every living organization will have tickets for sale.

Steve Goldschmidt, former ASUO president, and Bob Carl, former Emerald managing editor, co-chairman of the campus fund drive, said Tuesday that they hope all students, faculty and staff will attend the meet. Wendy Ray, KUGN radio sportscaster, is coordinating the drive off campus.

Such standouts as milers Dyrrol Burleson, and Jim Grelle, and shot putter Neal Steinhauer will participate in the meet.

Woodell is in satisfactory condition and he has been moved to a Portland hospital to be closer to his Beaverton home. His Theta Chi fraternity brothers report that Woodell is in "good spirits." He will probably be in the hospital for several more months.

Club to Discuss Stadium Plans

A "fact-disseminating" forum for presentation of facts relating to construction of a University stadium in North Bank Park will be sponsored by the Metro-Civic Club at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Eugene City Hall council chambers.

The meeting will be open to Metro Club members and guests; the club membership will take no action and make no recommendations, according to President Bert Dotson.

Dotson said the club's Board of Governors is further emphasizing that this is not a meeting at which the club will question the construction of the stadium in North Bank Park.

The Board of Governors decided on the fact forum because of indications of confusion and misunderstanding relating to some parts of the stadium construction program. The board felt a fact-disseminating forum would help explain current plans and future uses of land in North Bank Park.

Representatives from seven agencies have been invited to appear at the forum. These include the University, the City of Eugene, Central Lane Planning Commission, State Highway Department Engineers, Bureau of Public Roads, Lane County commissioners, and Eugene Chamber of Commerce. The representative of each agency appearing will be provided in advance of the meeting with a series of questions.

Dotson said Ken Kohnen, chairman of a recently-appointed liaison committee on stadium planning, will present his committee findings at this meeting.

Faculty Member Files Test Case

A test case asking for a declaratory judgment on the constitutionality of a state law prohibiting campaign contributions by state employees has been filed by Leona Tyler, dean of the Graduate School.

Miss Tyler announced at Tuesday's informal faculty meeting that she had filed the case last week and that Arthur Johnson, a Eugene attorney, will handle it in Circuit Court.

There have been no actual infractions of the Oregon statute by faculty members, she said. This is just a test case to get a court interpretation. At the pres-

ent, faculty members wishing to contribute campaigns often do so in their wives' names.

In other unofficial business at the informal meeting, University President Arthur S. Flemming announced that staff members are being gathered for the two new schools which will open in the fall—the School of Librarianship and the School of Community Service and Public Affairs. A dean for the School of Librarianship has been selected but the formal announcement will not be made for a few days.

Jarold A. Kieffer, assistant to President Flemming, and a member of the Eugene auditorium committee, said that two sites are being considered for the auditorium. The possibility of the University utilizing the auditorium was also discussed.

In answer to the question, Flemming gave his approval to faculty involvement in state and local politics.

An ad hoc summer committee is being planned to review the purpose of the Faculty Advisory Committee.

Potential faculty reaction to the ASUO course evaluation was also discussed.
