

'Upward Bound' Grant Approved

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Approval of \$236,809 grant by the Office of Economic Opportunity to expand the University's "Upward Bound" program this coming year has been reported from Washington, D.C., Monday by Rep. Robert Duncan (D-Ore.)

The money will be used to bring 75 disadvantaged high school graduates to the university, give them intensive help this summer, then "phase" them into regular university classes.

The program is intended to demonstrate that students from low-income backgrounds can be academically successful in college if given sufficient preparation in advance.

The university operated a similar program this past year and will build the new program on some of its findings.

Arthur Pearl, University professor of education and newly named director of the campus Upward Bound program, said next year's students will include about 30 continuing on from this year, plus 40 or 45 students drawn from high schools around the state.

Included will be children of migrant workers, Indians, Negroes, and other children of poor rural and urban families.

The money will be used to sup-

port a summer program of college-level studies for the group, plus supplemental financial assistance after the students enter regular university classes next fall.

The grant is in addition to \$95,000 previously awarded the University to offer a summer program for 75 11th grade high school youths, who will return to their regular classes at the end of the summer.

This program will be intended to help compensate for academic deficiencies on the part of the high school students and to stimulate their interest and motivation to attend college when they graduate from high school.

Women's PE Sessions Offered

Fourteen workshops, ranging from contemporary and folk dance to a gymnastics session for high school girls, are being offered in physical education for women at the University this summer.

Seven guest faculty members, including a dance artist and choreographer from New York, and a first alternate on a U.S. Olympic team, will join resident faculty of the School of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation to present the workshop.

All of the sessions, except the workshop for high school girls, are scheduled from Monday to July 8.

Workshops offered include tennis, one for teachers of intermediate skill and another for learning advanced playing tactics; gymnastics for both beginning and ad-

vanced performers; contemporary dance for men and women; two in track and field, scheduled at different times; basketball and badminton for teachers; folk dance for men and women; and a working laboratory for development of teaching aids.

Thirty high school girls with a special interest and some talent in gymnastics will participate in the special gymnastics session July 11 to 15.

Mrs. Carolyn Osborn Bowers of Ohio State University will be guest faculty member for the week of intensive instruction. She was a participant in competitive gymnastics from 1956 to 1964, first alternate on the 1960 Olympic team, and qualified for the 1964 Olympic trials.

Parking Rules To Be Enforced

All summer students must register their vehicles with the Physical Plant in the business office in Emerald Hall or at the Physical Plant.

Summer students are only authorized to park in lots designated "summer students."

Those vehicles parked in spaces reserved for state vehicles, disabled persons, any other space reserved by license number, fire lanes, parked in such a manner as to disrupt the normal flow of traffic, parked so as to constitute a hazard, or parked on landscaped areas will be towed away at the expense of the operator.

Draft Quota Up in August

Oregon's draft quota for August will be 237, compared to 169 for July and 123 for June, Sprague Carter, state draft director, announced Friday.

The national quota for August is 32,600 men.

Oregon also has orders to deliver 16 doctors to the services before the end of July. This quota is being filled with interns so far as possible.

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
