

'Job Corps Center Not Poverty Cure'

A lecture entitled "Tongue Point: Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow" was given in the Browsing Room of the Student Union last night.

Guy Shellenbarger, who was the assistant director for the University's Tongue Point Job Corps Center, was the speaker for the evening.

The Tongue Point Center is a part of President Johnson's War on Poverty program.

The Job Corps has been es-

tablished since Feb. 1, 1964. It is designed to salvage high school dropout students who do not possess the necessary skills to get jobs on their own.

The screening for the trainees is done at various employment agencies throughout the United States.

The program is currently proving successful; however, there are still many problems, Shellenbarger said.

When the boys come to Tongue Point they are usually rated 100 per cent failures by high school standards.

They have a bitter attitude which is the product of approximately 16 years of failure at home, school, and jobs, he added.

Most of the boys need to be toned down socially, and about 45 per cent of them are Negroes. The boys have an extreme desire to get along with others, he said, and they are eager to learn.

The Tongue Point Center currently has three programs to aid the boys in their vocational training. They have about 800 boys chosen from 200,000 applications. Out of the 800 boys 20 to 30 receive diplomas and are sent to their jobs. "The Tongue Point Job Corps program certainly cannot cure poverty," Shellenbarger concluded, "it cannot reach enough boys rapidly enough."

Browsing Room Plans Lecture

Arthur H. Steinhaus, authority on the subject of relaxation, will present a Browsing Room lecture Wednesday at the University.

He will discuss what physical education can do for the "spirit and mind of man" during the 7:30 p.m. public lecture at the Erb Memorial Student Union.

An emeritus professor of George Williams College in Chicago, Ill., he is currently a professor of physiology at the Chicago College of Osteopathy.

The noted physiologist was consultant to the secretary of the navy during World War II on physical fitness and physical rehabilitation. He has been a Fulbright lecturer in both Germany and Japan.

Some of the books he has written include "Tobacco and Health," published in 1939; "More Firepower for Health Education," 1948; "How to Keep Fit and Like It," 1957; and "Toward an Understanding of Health and Physical Education," 1963.

He is also co-author of "Methods of Research in Health, Physical Education, and Recreation," published in 1959, and a contributor to such periodicals as the American Journal of Physiology.

Steinhaus is at the University this summer to teach a four-week summer workshop in neuromuscular relaxation which began June 20.

University Gives Steel Fellowship

The University, recently named a participating institution in the United States Steel Foundation Fellowship Program, has chosen Jens Joseph Robinson, a Neahkah-nie high school teacher to receive the University's \$4,800 two-year fellowship.

Robinson, one of the 80 U.S. Steel foundation fellows in the nation, is chairman of the science department and a chemistry teacher at Neahkah-nie High School, where he has been a member of the staff since 1960. He also serves as assistant to the superintendent of schools of Neahkah-nie school district 56.

At the present time, many large institutions often submit requests for five times more money than they receive. Almost all of these big-volume research schools can and will expand, given the funds to do the job.

When money is sidetracked to small colleges experimenting with research, the result is a slow down in the degree of the nation's technological advance at a time when speed is important. It is incredible to believe that a college which has a small research facility with limited resources can do a study as efficiently as a school with a well-developed and coordinated program which can be expanded.

Research requires excellence, not mediocrity, and the small school cannot offer excellence. Let the small school concentrate in other fields and leave research to those schools which can handle it.
