

Pearl Says:

'Upward Bound Students Face Integration Problems'

Arthur S. Pearl, professor of education and head of Upward Bound, spoke Sunday to the Lutheran Student Association on the difficulties which Upward Bound students have in integrating socially on campus.

His talk dealt with two aspects of the problem: the unwillingness of students and faculty to accept Upward Bound students and the tendency of disadvantaged people to band together in their search for security.

According to Pearl, the Upward Bound students have been made to feel inadequate at school and have had "an identity imposed on them." University people have continued the process of social and intellectual segregation both by direct insults and by a condescending attitude, he said.

Pearl said people had voiced resentment to the government money that the Upward Bound students were getting, even though these people themselves were getting government subsidies. One woman was quoted as having said "They're the ones who look as if they don't belong on campus."

Pearl stressed the need for campus groups to encourage Upward Bound students. He said he also felt that some of the faculty were punishing students who had been punished for 18 years and needed rewards and encouragement more.

The second half of the speech dealt with the search for identity in a dehumanizing society. This problem, Pearl said, is particularly acute for minority groups who tend to band to-

gether and create self-segregation.

Pearl expanded the notion of identity-seeking to include people in general. Personal identity and to a certain group identity are necessary to integrate into a society.

He expressed concern for those who base their identities on fraudulent grounds and on nostalgia.

Both right-wing and left-wing political organizations, he said, indulge in nostalgia. The right-

wingers want to go back to simple community and family organization, the left-wingers to the good-versus-bad disputes of the thirties.

He concluded with an appeal to the Lutheran Student Organization and other such campus subgroups to help the Upward Bound students both by acting as tutors and by inviting them to share in social life, to discover their identities and become true members of the campus community.

✓ Anyone writing two "bad checks" will not be allowed to enjoy the privilege of cashing checks at either the Student Union or the Co-op for the remainder of the school year.

Please bear with us during those occasional times when the Main Desk is unable to cash your check. An average of \$200 in checks is cashed each hour and unexpected demands deplete the supply of cash on hand.

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
